THE directors of the library company of Baltimore, think themselves called upon by the sixth article of the constitution, to make to the company the following communication.

Since the first institution of the company, such considerable additions have been made to it, that it now consists of two hundred and thirty-four members, all of whom have paid the price of a share.

There have been received from the members of the company 4680 dollars; and to which have been added 57 dolls. 92 cts. arising from the hire of books, and from fines and forfeitures, and 6 dolls. from the sale of a book not wanted for the library.

The directors, in executing the trust reposed in them, have enacted several by-laws, such as they thought likely to conduce to the interest of the institution under their guardianship.

The directors have exercised the power accorded to them in the tenth article of the constitution; but the books forbidden to be let out of the library are few in number.

In choosing a depository for the books, they have been governed by necessity, not inclination. The smallness of their room, for which, however, they are obliged to pay 100 dollars per annum, has caused them to search lately for a larger, which they have not yet been able to find in an eligible situation.

Mr. JOHN BRICE, junior, has been elected treasurer, and as it was found necessary to lay upon him the burthen of collecting, the directors thought it but just to allow him two and an half per cent. on the monies received by him.

Thinking the interests of the institution required a charter, the directors petitioned the general assembly, at their late session, to grant them one; but their application was not crowned with success.

The following sums are due from the funds of the company:—To Mr. George McDowell, for binding, &c. dolls. 10, 90 1/2 cents; to Mr. Benjamin Williams, for rent to Mr. S. Allardice, of Philadelphia, for a copperplate and 6000 impressions, as labels for the book, 30, 25; to Mr. John Mullanphy, for books purchased lately of him, 105, 51; to Mr. Solomon Etting, for books, 6; to Mr. James Rice, for books purchased before the printing of the catalogue, and for stationary, 286, 17; and to Mr. John Hayes, for printing the catalogue, &c. 40 dolls.

In the course of their duty, the directors have been led to conclude, that benefit would result to the institution, from altering the constitution; so as to make, in addition to the reasons assigned in the 7th article, habitual inattention to the duties of his office, and 3 months absence from the state of Maryland, sufficient reasons for

declaring the place of a director vacant; and to allow the directors, if they deem it expedient, to choose persons members, at the same meeting at which they are nominated.

It may be proper to mention, that vacancies having taken place, in the board of directors, by the resignation of Messrs. Carey, Poulteney, and Field; Messieurs Nicholas Rogers, Henry Nicols, and James Priestly, were regularly elected in their stead.

For a full and accurate account of the receipts and expenditures of the company, the directors refer them to the annexed statement.

Extract of the 12th article of the constitution. "Every person who shall neglect to make the annual payment, which shall be on the second Mouday in May, in every year, or within ten days thereafter, shall pay for the use of the library one cent, for every day he shall neglect said payment; and whenever his fines, and deficient contributions, amount to the value of a share, such share shall be forfeited. In like manner, if he possess a plurality of shares."

Left there, brig Ferrel, Bolton; schooners Alfred, Gardner, do. to fail next day; Betty, Sturgis, do. to fail same day; Retrieve, Coffin, Newburyport; ship Olive, O'Brien, Philadelphia; brig Hannah, Watts, Portsmouth; sloop Electa, Chatwell, Charleston.

Same day arrived schooner Hazard, Miller, 26 days from Barbados. Left there schooners Hazard, Sprague, Bolton, to fail next day; Friendship, Ella, of Penobscot, bound to Carolina; brig M'Lellan, Portland, to fail in 7 days; sloop Butler, of Connecticut.

Arrived ship Barbara, Harvey, 24 days from Cape-Francois. Left there Speedwell, Goodhue, Newburyport; Jane, Hatch, do. to fail in 2 days; brig Dispatch, of Portland to fail in 15 days for Philadelphia; Betty, Green, Boston, to fail in 15 days, for Baltimore; Sally, Rofs, of Philadelphia, to fail in 8 days.

The day before capt. Harvey failed, a packet-boat arrived from Porto-Rico, informing, that the Susannah, Smith; from Biddeford, was taken, vessel and cargo condemned, she was from St. Vincent's; a schooner belonging to Penobscot, from Barbados, taken and condemned, with her cargo.

Captain H. also informs, that the ship Polly, Purvoss, of Portland, has been taken and sent into Jean Rabel, a French port, expected to be condemned immediately, one of the seamen having been bribed to swear against the ship; sloop Pope, of Philadelphia, taken and carried into same port, vessel and cargo condemned—sloop Fox, Brooks, of Hartford, carried into Cape-Francois, condemned.

April 29. Arrived brig Success, Walker, 22 days from St. Vincents. Left there schooner Columbia, of Kennebunk; the only American vessel there. The ship Madison, owned at the eastward, failed for Norfolk, two days before the Success.

Same day arrived sch'r Isabella, captain Jones, 30 days from Porto Rico.

Capt. Jones, on his homeward bound passage, from Guadaloupe, was taken and carried into St. Kitts; but cleared—Left there schooner Nabby, Munroe of Providence, from Africa, had been taken by the French, re-taken by the English, and selling cargo to pay the salvage.

After leaving St. Kitts, captain Jones was again taken by a French privateer, manned by Spaniards, and carried to Porto-Rico; but by his spirited conduct, got cleared, after paying every expence that injustice could suggest. Left there captain Hubbard, of Philadelphia, vessel and cargo condemned; captain T. Williams of Norfolk, schooner and cargo condemned, captain and crew robbed of every thing, and dependent on the humanity of their countrymen there, for support; captain Merrill of Saco, vessel cleared, cargo condemned; ship William, Strong, of Portland, vessel and cargo condemned, without trial.

April 30. This day arrived schooner Betty, Vincent, 42 days from Essequibo. Left there brig Hannah and Mary, Hills, of Bolton; schooner Juno Miller, captain dead, of do. sloop Cato, Ingerol, of do.

Same day arrived schooner Hazard, captain Sprague, 19 days from St. Thomas.

Same day sloop Wilhelm, Lendell, 15 days from the Havana; left there the Asia, captain Lamb, and the schooner Maria, Hatch, of Bolton; with a great number of other American vessels, whose names we have not been able to procure.

Same day arrived ship Fame, Luce, 22 days from Guadaloupe; also brig Union, Smith, 27 days, from do. via St. Eustatia, 21 days.

HISTORY OF THE ALGERINE BUSINESS.

An obliging correspondent has favored us with the following communication from captain O'Brien, so well known for his

sufferings in Algiers—and so justly celebrated for his exertions to support the honor, and advance the interests of the United States. It is dated at Philadelphia, the 15th inst. & says: "I left this city in June last—arrived in Lisbon, and took on board 220,000 dollars, besides presents, and destined for Algiers, but was captured on the 18th of August, adjacent to Algiers, by a corsair of Tripoli—ad 1, brig, money, and crew, carried to Tripoli, and with the crew of the ship-Betty of Bolton, made slaves of. But shewing the Dey of Algiers' passport, and making appear I was still the slave of the Dey of Algiers; that the money being delivered to me by the United States, was the same as if delivered to the Dey, and it becoming, under the Dey's guarantee, and not for the ransom of the captives, I was, after two days examination, liberated, and arrived in Algiers the 1st of October—delivered the money, and by the well-timed and well adapted plans of Mr. Barlow, I failed the 10th of October, commissioned on the business of the peace of the United States, with the regencies of Tunis and Tripoli. I arrived at Tunis the 16th of October. The Dey of Algiers wrote to the Bey of Tunis to make the peace on the terms prescribed by the Dey. Tunis would not, but demanded equal to three times that sum. After many audiences and conferences to have the demands of the government of Tunis for the peace lowered, I found that the terms, so rendered, were the voluntary terms on which Tunis would make a peace with the U. States, and that Tunis would not make a peace on the terms which the dey of Algiers had prescribed. I forwarded to Mr. Barlow in Algiers, who communicated the Tunisian demand to the dey, who would not admit Mr. Barlow to acquiesce.

"Leaving the Tunis business in this situation I proceeded to Tripoli, and with much difficulty made the peace there the 4th November. Left in Tripoli capt. Joseph Ingraham, as American charge des affaires, and failed from Tripoli the 27th November; brought away the remaining part of the crew of the ship Betty.

"Arrived at Tunis the 7th December, there I received Mr. Barlow's and the dey's orders, to demand a definitive answer from the bey of Tunis, if he would make the peace with the United States, on the terms prescribed by the dey of Algiers—the bey of Tunis would not. Having discretionary powers, I tried what could be done; but the demands of the bey of Tunis were not within my limits. I failed from Tunis and arrived in Algiers 3d January, and explained all requisite affairs to the potent dey, and to Mr. Barlow. The dey was much enraged at the non-compliance of the bey of Tunis—and, on account of some old grudges, and his rejecting the dey's intercession in our affairs, the dey ordered his eastern camp of 60,000 men, to enter the Tunisian territory. His troops plundered, cut off many heads and ears, and returned to the Algerine territory. This was to feel the political pulse of the government of Tunis; to know if it would still continue to be biased or dependent on the dey of Algiers. The dey declared that the business of Tunis relative to its making peace with the United States, was under his guarantee, and in consequence, gave me orders to proceed to the western world. I left Algiers the 18th January—arrived—performing quarantine at Lisbon, and failed from thence the 18th February—arrived here the 1st of April—the brig and O'Brien are under repair.

"I now tell you candidly, that no American vessel should enter the Mediterranean, until our peace with all the Barbary States is fully established and published by the authority of the United States."

PHILADELPHIA, May 6. NEW-THEATRE.

The engagements of the managers, rendering it necessary, from recent occurrences, that they should open the theatre at Baltimore, so as to close the season there on the 10th of June next, they have thought it expedient, (with the approbation of the individual performers, who are particularly interested) to discontinue the present course of benefits till that period has elapsed, the entertainments of the theatre will, therefore, close with this evening.

Extra of a letter from Cape-Francois, dated April 10. Our situation in St. Domingo has become truly brilliant. Every where we are victorious, and cultivation and commerce flourish once again, especially since the commissioners have determined to rent out the plantations.

You will see in the newspapers that the Eastern mountains, of the French part of St. Domingo, are totally freed from the brigands. The English and emigrants have been every where either cut to pieces or completely routed. The count Ed. De Rouvray, has been beaten. He had a musket ball through his hat. He fled, leaving his correspondence, of which you will find extracts in the paper behind.—Banique has been evacuated. The English and emigrants, before leaving it, set fire to it, and assassinated the Spaniards who were there. Gen. Touffaint L'Ouverture with an army of 20,000 men, well disciplined and well provided, has already conquered the Mirebalais. He marches towards Port-au-Prince, and is to-morrow to attack La-Croix des Bouquets. Gen. Moise, his nephew, is to penetrate with a division of his army in the quarter of l'Archaye, and then to attack St. Marc, which he will probably find evacuated.

But, in the mean time, the communication between the North, and South of the

Colony is completely restored, and already the armies of generals Touffaint, Laplume, and Beauvais have formed a junction to attack Port-au-Prince. I am in hopes we shall not want the treaty of peace to put us in complete possession of St. Domingo.

Capt. Gardner in 18 days from St. Croix informs, that on the 10th April, a large fleet, consisting of all the naval force that could be collected, with about 10,000 troops, failed from Martinique, destined, it was supposed, for an attack on Guadaloupe. He heard no news of Porto Rico, or St. Eustatius being taken, as was lately reported here.

Captain Gardner also informs that the brig Schuykill, Irwin, of this port, on her passage from New-York to Porto-Rico, was taken by the British sloop of war Bull-Dog, and sent into Portola, on suspicion of the cargo being Spanish property, the vessel cleared. Three days out from St. Croix, capt. G. was boarded by a French privateer of 10 guns, from Curacao, on a cruise, who informed that he had taken the ship Ann, of London, outward bound and sent her for Porto-Rico; after examining the Ariel's papers she was dismissed without further trouble; a few days since spoke the Squirrel sloop of war, from the Delaware for the Bahamas, no vessels in company.

The Ruby, Church, is arrived at Savannah from Philadelphia.

The Echo, Boys, in 50 days from Dublin, arrived just as this paper was going to press—We do not learn that the brings any thing interesting.

Calcutta Gazette Extraordinary. Saturday, January 7.

1. Whereas the commerce of this port has suffered in the last and in the present year, by the enemy's privateers cruising in Balafore Roads, and off the entrance of the river; the governor general in council has resolved to equip an armed force for the protection thereof; and in order to assist in defraying the expence of the armament, he has further resolved, that a new duty of one per cent. be levied upon all imports and exports; which it is to be presumed will be more than compensated to the merchants, by the more favourable rates at which they will probably effect insurances, on goods liable to the risks now meant to be prevented.

And the following rules are, in consequence, hereby enacted to take place, from the promulgation thereof.

2. All goods paying the present duties of two and an half per cent, shall pay in future an addition of one per cent. making in all three and an half per cent.

3. All goods at present exempted from duties, are to pay a duty of one per cent. whether on importation or exportation.

4. Goods entered for re-exportation, and being allowed a drawback on re-exportation, shall continue to be allowed a drawback as at present of two and an half per cent. but shall not be allowed to receive back the additional duty of one per cent. paid on importation, and they are also to pay the one per cent. duty on exportation.

5. The collector of government customs at Calcutta is directed to make the charge for the one per cent. duty to each individual settling the same, clear and distinct from the present duties; and he is to carry the sums collected upon account of it to a separate head in order that the amount may be ascertainable at any time.

6. The collector is not to extend the fees of his office to the sums collected upon the one per cent. duty; but they are to remain in all respects the same as they now are.

Extra of a letter from Richmond, April 28.

"Last night a second attempt was made to rob the treasury of this state. The villains had removed the iron grating from one of the windows, but were stopped from further progress by an iron shutter within.

"This morning a bonfire was made in the public market, of all the gaming tables that could be found in the city, billiard tables excepted. This perhaps will be thought a strange phenomenon to be exhibited in Virginia, the supposed land of hazard."

A most melancholy accident happened in this city on Thursday evening last. As John de Marcellac (a preacher in the Society of Quakers) and the widow Mary Gray (sister to John Elliot, in Front-street) were returning to town in a one horse chair, between five and seven o'clock, in passing Callovhill-street, in Front-street, owing to the depth of the gutter, the carriage gave so great a jolt as to break one of the shafts, which frightening the horse, he immediately ran off; the consequence of

which was, Mr. de Marcellac and Mrs. Gray were both thrown out of the carriage—the latter of whom pitching her head against a post in the street, fractured her skull, and she died on the spot!—The gentleman also received considerable injury from the accident; but it is hoped he is out of danger.

We understand that this is not the first time that accidents have been occasioned by these large gutters in the middle of our streets.—We trust this shocking catastrophe will draw the attention of the public to a remedy for this grievance.

SALEM, May 2.

From the Isle of France, Jan. 1, 1797.

Two English 74's and a frigate have been cruising off this island for 3 months, but are now gone. Notwithstanding they sometimes stood in so near as to exchange shots with the forts, they never took any thing, and several valuable English prizes arrived in the mean time.

The French have an excellent division of frigates here, which they have distributed all over the India seas—four of which division had a smart engagement in the Bay of Bengal, near the Straights, with two English 74's, which was obstinate and long—they parted, and the English were not in a situation or disposition to renew the action.

It is thought there will be war work in India with the two fleets. Prizes drop in daily. Coffee is still rising and hardly any to be had—price 16 dolls. per sack. The Island is in a good state of defence.

[The above was received by capt. Ropes. He informs that there had not been received at the Island any orders to capture American vessels from English ports—the Americans there were more afraid of English cruisers.]

BOSTON, May 2.

On Sunday, captain Richardson arrived at Salem, in a brig from Bordeaux. He failed March 13, the latest papers obtained by the Salem editor, from him were to March 4. Mr. Wm. Grey, of this town, was a passenger in the above brig. We have heard of nothing very important.—Commercial letters of the usual kind were received by the above vessel, which is a circumstance indicative of confidence in the continuance of the intercourse between the two countries.

Yesterday captain Ropes arrived at Salem, from the Isle of Bourbon. No news from him has yet reached us.

NEW-YORK, May 6.

Yesterday arrived the ship Columbia, capt. Kelly, 56 days from Liverpool, who spoke on the 15th March in lat. 47, 43, long. 18, 00, the ship Bald Eagle, capt. Cassidy, from Wiscasset, bound to Liverpool, 40 days out, short of provisions, which capt. K. supplied him with.

On the 26th March, spoke the ship Martha, of Bolton, from the Isle of Bourbon and St. Helena, bound to Hamburg, in lat. 45, 26, long. 25, 00.

On the 4th inst. spoke the ship Oneida, capt. Sherry, of New-York, 35 leagues E. S. E. of Sandy Hook; the ship Factor, capt. Kemp, in sight.

The ship Commerce, Wood, of New-York, and the ship Astrea, Tinkham, of Wiscasset, were lying in Liverpool, when the Columbia failed.

The ship Swan, Woodham, was to fail in a few days after the Columbia.

The brig Gultavus, Turner, for Portsmouth, N. H. and the Freemason, Randall, for Baltimore, failed in company with the Columbia.

IMPORTANT.

Captain Craig left Barbados on the 18th April, and has politely favored us with the following information, and Barbados papers as late as the 15th. That on the 16th April a vessel arrived at Barbados, 48 hours from Dominico, bringing the important news of the English having effected a landing at Grozier, in Grand Terre, with 8000 regular troops and as many others as would make their number amount to 15,000 effective men.

The following is extracted from the Barbados Mercury of the 15th ult.

BRIDGE-TOWN, (Barbados) April 12. We feel pleasure in stating the safe arrival of the ships which gave rise to an alarm on Sunday morning last, consisting of the Cork fleet, and accompanied by some vessels destined for several of the leeward islands, with a convoy for Jamaica under care of the Profelyte which did not come in sight, but kept on for their destined port, those who stopped here and took their departure on Monday evening, were accompanied by his majesty's ship Cyane.

The speculations of the present week respecting the intention and design of the projected expedition from Martinico, take a different turn to those of the last.—It is now said to be for the invasion of Guadeloupe, and in confirmation of this opinion, we learn that the forces have left Martinico, and are assembled at Dominico, which from its vicinity, will the better facilitate, a descent upon the enemy's country. We the more readily give into this opinion from an article which we have received from Martinico, stating that, a certain ex-noble, distinguished by the confidence of the British, has lately had several private conferences with the republican chief of Guadeloupe, who now holding his authority by the precarious tenor of his own usurpation, cannot return to France with safety; and also knowing that in America he can find no asylum from the sanctioned acts of piracy committed by its cruisers on her citizens, seems inclined to throw himself upon British mercy by surrendering to their arms a country which through his former atrocity has not only been deluged with the blood of some of her bravest sons, but also issuing from its bosom hords of brigands, has depopulated one half of our colonies.

Capt. Cooper informs, that on the 10th April, a fleet under command of admiral Harvey, with ten thousand troops, failed on a secret expedition, supposed to be against Guadeloupe or Porto Rico. Prince Edward had arrived at Martinique, from Halifax, with 3000 troops, who embarked on board the above mentioned fleet.
