The 7th Instant, at Night, the Duke of Cumberland Packet, Captain Goodridge, arrived here from Fal-mouth, in 7 Weeks and one Day, by whom we have the following Advices; viz.

P A R I S, June 20.

THE following account has been received by the East-India Company from Baron Law de Lauriston, his Majesty's Commissary and Commandant-General of the French settlements in India, in a letter from Chandernagor, dated, August 31, 1765.

The Seyques, an idolatrous people, inhabiting the neighbourhood of Lahors and Cachemire, whose name was hardly known two years ago, have beaten Abdaly and the Patanes, whom he commanded: They afterwards took possession of Lahors, and have since made a conquest of Delhy with an army of above 200,000 men; and it's said they have massacred all the descendants of Tamerlane. The Seyques are a particular sect, like the Rajpoutes, the Dajates, &c. but are less superstitious, for they exclude nobody from their Society, but admit Christians, Mahometans and Idolaters, indiscriminately. They wear long beards and long hair, and eat all kinds of food. They have no Chief but are governed by four of the principal of their sect, which are elected yearly, or perhaps every three years by the people. Their King or Legislator is represented by a great Book, which they place

upon a stool in the middle of their Assembly, with a sabre, shield, and poignard upon it. The four Councillors open this Book, and read, or pretend to read, then deliberate, and announce the orders of the King to the people, who are obliged to submit to them on pain of incurring the displeasure of the Divinity. The Seyques, however, have not followed this custom at Delhy, but have placed upon the throne of the Mogul a Prince named Gobinsingue, who has already had rups struck with his inscription.

Warsaw, June 14. The situation of public affairs become daily more prosperous, from the great attention of the King to suppress all abuses, and introduce good order. The Army, the Finances, by Trade, and the Administration of Justice, are the four great objects of his Majesty's care; the Senate assits him as much as possible, and all the publick boards being animated by such examples, execute the business of their respective departments with the greatest zeal and assiduity.

Ratisbon, June 19. Letters from Hungary advise, that the Farmers in some districts pretending that they are ill used by their Lords, continue to commit such violences that it's thought the Court of Vienna will be obliged to send some troops to bring them to order.

Vienna, June 21. The last letters from Constantinople, dated the 25th of May, advise, that on the 2d of that month, in the morning, a violent earthquake happened there, the course of which was directed from the south to the north. Several Mosques, the Mint, and other buildings, were destroyed; the Seraglio received a great deal of damage, and part of the Keys, by the shock and the violent agitation of the Sea, were thrown down. The suburb of Pera suffered much less, only some chimnies being shook down there. When the courier left the City, upwards of 1000 persons were computed to be buried under the ruins; and had the same accident happened when the people are in the Mosques, or in the Baths, a much greater number would probably have suffered the same fate. The Grand Signior was encamped in the gardens of the Seraglio with his women, and the whole court.

Particular letters from thence mention, that from the 2d of May to the 2d of June following, 34 heavy shocks of an earthquake had been felt: In one of those letters it is further added, that nothing was set on fire by the said misfortune; but of what other consequences happened, we expect to have more particulars.

Berlin, July 1. Prince Ferdinand of Brunwick finding himself obliged to beg the King's leave to retire from his service, his Majesty has been pleased to consent to it; in consequence of which his Serene Highness has resigned his posts and pensions.

Paris, June 30. Notwithstanding the accounts which have been formerly related by sailors, concerning a country at the southern extremity of America, called the land of the Patagonians, of a race of men eight or ten feet in height, yet our naturalists placing more confidence in their own systems than in the reports of other men, have constantly maintained, that, excepting a few individuals without respect to any climate, no giants or dwarfs were to be found. The existence, however, of giants, as a people, is confirmed by the whole crew of an English man of war, which has just returned from the circuit of the globe. Dr. Maty, a physician of eminence at London, has written a letter on the subject to M. de la Condamine, who has communicated it to the Academy of Sciences. "The existence of giants (says the Doctor) is here confirmed. Between 4 and 500 Patagonians, of at least 8 or 9 feet in height, have been seen and examined by the company of one of our ships, just returned from a voyage round the world; the Captain of which, who is himself six feet high, could hardly reach the chin of one of these men with his hand."

L O N D O N, June 23.

Colonel West, brother to the Earl Delaware, is appointed Aide-Camp to his Majesty, in the room of the late Earl of Sutherland.

Letters from Warsaw say, that the King of Poland is going to establish in that city a board for assisting merchants and traders who shall be straitened to keep their credit, provided that they can make it appear they are not behind hand in the world, nor guilty of any frauds, but only cannot immediately answer the demands made on them. The money is to be advanced without interest.

It appears by a map just published of the seat of war between the Grand Seignor and Prince Heracitus of Georgia, that this intrepid hero has penetrated already above 500 miles into the Ottoman Empire. It should therefore be no matter of surprize, that the Turks are seized with such a panick as to cause them to draw troops from their garrisons in all the provinces throughout that vast Empire, and raise recruits in order to make head against the successful inroads made by the Georgian Conqueror.

The Hague Gazette, under the head London June 13, says, "Some persons pretend to be assured, that the King of Prussia has made instances to our Court to induce it to cede to him one of the British islands in America; and that there, is great appearance that his demand will be complied with."

The Corporation of Lancaster have presented the freedom of that town to the Marquis of Rockingham, the Earl of Dartmouth, General Conway, Mr. Dowdeswell, Sir George Saville, and Sir William Meredith, Barts.

It is said that the Hon. Commodore Byron will be created a Rear Admiral of his Majesty's navy before his departure for the South Seas.

July 1. Yesterday a cause which took up 5 hours in hearing, that greatly affects mankind in general, was tried at Guildhall before Lord Camden, against a late Commodore of a Squadron of his Majesty's ships of war, for impressing from a merchantman a free-born Englishman on board his ship, and turning him before the mast for 15 months; when the Jury, which was a special one, brought in a verdict for the Sailor of 400l. it appearing in the course of the trial, that the honest mariner was kept from his own ship, an East-Indiaman, and left at Batavia in the East-Indies in 1763, from which island, it is well known (since its being in possession of the Dutch) it is very difficult for an Englishman to escape.

Letters from Cadix inform, that the King's magazines are provided with foreign ship-timber, sufficient to build twelve new men of war of the line.

They write from Gibraltar, that the Dey of Algiers had obliged the Dutch to make out a new set of Mediterranean passes, which would render it difficult for them to protect any longer the ships and merchandise of those nations, with whom the Regency are, or may be, at war.

We hear that Commodore Byron is to winter at the Brazils, in order to take the most early advantage of the season, for a speedy passage through the straits of Magellan.

Last Friday arrived at Dover, the Randolph, Capt. Walker, in 29 days, from the Capes of Virginia, in whom came passengers the Governor's Lady, and his son, Francis Fauquier, Esq; who immediately set out for London.

July 3. A fire broke out last Wednesday in the afternoon at Hilversum, a town about two leagues and a half from Utrecht, where the church and between three and four hundred houses and barns were reduced to ashes. It began in the house of a Jew, who was melting tallow. The damage is computed at upwards of 600,000 florins.

We hear from Paris, that his Serene Highness the Prince of Brunswick is set out from that city to Genoa, where he intends staying some time; from whence his Serene Highness proposes going to Turin.

A letter from New-York says, That the Scots, who are very numerous in all the American colonies, on receiving the celebrated speech of the great patriot for the repeal of the Stamp-Act, in which he pays a compliment to their country, where he found a race of brave men, which he drew from the mountains of the north, expressed the highest satisfaction.

The exact state of the Spanish marine, according to letters lately received from Madrid, is said to be as follows, viz. 14 ships of the line at Ferrol nine of them rigged and in commission; 11 at Cartagena, only five in commission; 23 at Cadix, seventeen in good order; No mention is made of frigates or men of war upon the stocks.

Letters received here, by the way of Venice, from Bassora, make no mention of the late important revolution said to have happened in the Mogul's country.

They write from Paris, that the French troops who were sent to quell the insurrections in Spain, are on the march back again from the Spanish frontiers.

July 5. His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester set out this day for Plymouth, attended by Capt. Cox, his Equerry, in order to take the command of his regiment there, General Pulteney's.

Letters from New-York, dated May 25, say that the merchants and principal inhabitants are erecting an elegant statue of the Right Hon. William Pitt, Esq;

Some material alterations have been made amongst the members that compose the several assemblies in the American provinces.

We are credibly informed, that Mr. P---, during his glorious Administration, never received to his own use any of the profits or emoluments belonging to this office, except the bare salary that every body knows to be annexed to it, he having always caused to be deposited in the Treasury, for public use, all the money allowed him for secret service, together with all the perquisites of his office, many thousands of which have ever since remained in the Treasury, which the Lords thereof know not what to do with; nor would any of the Ministry, since his resignation, take upon themselves to dispose of, or meddle with it, lest this generous inflexible Patriot should again become Prime Minister, and call them to account for it, as none but him has a right to dispose of it. The annals of this country cannot produce such another instance of ministerial disinterestedness and public spirit, tho' France can boast of her Duke Sully, who perhaps was the only Minister that ever displayed the patriotic virtues of Mr. P---.

It is said that the port of London will be open in a few days for the importation of live cattle from Ireland for a limited time.

July 8. An account of the number of men of war built at Genoa for the service of France since the last treaty at Versailles, has been received here, and is said to be as follows: four ships of the line, navigated to Toulon by Genoese sailors without guns; two of sixty-four, a frigate and two bombs, brought home by Frenchmen without guns; three seventies, a sixty, and four frigates at Rochfort; besides several transports at the above, laden with timber for the marine arsenals.

July 12. Letters from Bassora of the 12th of April advise, that the English Squadron which was sent from Bombay to oblige the Shach Soliman to restore the English ships that he had taken, arrived there the 26th of March, and was composed of six men of war. These letters say, that the Shach Soliman had sent several vessels to endeavour to intercept some galleys and other Turkish vessels, which went from Bassora, commanded by the Bashaw of that place but that the former having undertaken too much, the English attacked and took three of them, sunk one, and massacred the Arabs, who jumped over-board in order to get on shore. It is added, that the English had been informed that three more Turkish vessels were arrived as a reinforcement at Boucher, which makes it believed that when they are joined, their design is to attempt to make a settlement in the island of Karet.

A letter from Pera, a suburb of Constantinople, gives the following account of the late earthquake: It happened on the 22d, at half an hour after five in the morning, and lasted near three minutes. Almost all the public buildings are in ruins. The Vizir's house, which was built of stone, and contained several hundred persons, is destroyed. All the people in it were killed, except a few who were taken out of the ruins two days after the accident. The first shock was followed the same day by twelve or thirteen lesser ones, and including these, twenty-six have been counted within the compass of a few days.

We are informed, that the Giants found by Commodore Byron, measured from eight feet and a half to ten feet in height, and every way stout in proportion. The mens feet measured eighteen inches. When the Commodore first went on shore, the Giants came down to him, to the number of 500, men, women, and children, many of whom the Commodore dressed with ribbons, and other trinkets, which pleased them much. We are further informed, these Giants appeared to be a very quiet, inoffensive people; and if they ever used any offensive weapons, they carefully concealed them from our people. The Commodore made but a short stay, as it was an incommensurable place for the ship where he landed.

Yesterday some dispatches said to be of importance, were again received from Sir Andrew Mitchell, his Britannick Majesty's Ambassador at the court of Berlin.

It is confidently reported that the Right Hon. William Pitt, Esq; was yesterday appointed one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

It is certain that the Right Hon. Mr. Pitt was yesterday morning sent for; and that a total change of the administration is resolved upon.

It is thought that France harbours no good intentions towards England, as she hath increased her navy so greatly, that she hath now, it is said, eighty ships of war, many of them very large, in the ports of Brest and Toulon only. Such increase of the French navy is the strongest proof that they intend to break with us again, as soon as they find a favourable juncture, since it cannot answer any other purpose. However, it is said that some ships of war will be immediately ordered to cruise upon the French coast, to watch the motions of their fleets.

July 15. The privy council on Friday, was the fullest for some months past.

Extract of a Letter from an Officer in the East-India service, dated from Bengal, in December last.

On Lord Clive's arrival here, Carnatic were threatened with an invasion of an army of 80,000 men, headed by the South of the Decon, who demanded a seventy years tribute from our Nabob. In consequence of which, all that could bear arms were in the field, in order to repail this formidable force, &c. and could you believe it, our small army pursued them to the boundaries of the country; but in fact, the fame of his Lordship's arrival in the East, contributed a great deal towards the retreat of this great army."

A gentleman in Bengal has sent over to a gentleman here, a parcel of several kinds of ore, found some hundred miles in the country, and those places led to the company; two of these are a rich silver ore, the other seems to be gold, but has not yet been tried. He has likewise sent home some of the abestos found in that country, which is looked upon as being of the true kind; and in his letter adds, the silver ore was only dug from part of the second stratum, so that it is very probable these mines may be of great value.

On Saturday morning the Right Hon. William Pitt, who is appointed one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, arrived in town, and immediately set out for Richmond, to his Majesty, where he staid a considerable time.

On Sunday Mr. Pitt had a long conference with the Right Hon. Henry Seymour Conway, at his house in Pall-Mall.

We hear that all the great officers of state were on Sunday at Court, and that the intended alterations in the Ministry had not then been declared, but it is said they will be to-morrow or Friday.

Yesterday there was a numerous council at the Right Hon. Mr. Secretary Conway's house in Pall-Mall, at which Count Bethmar, by desire, attended; the business of which is said to be relative to the intended marriage between the King of Denmark, his Master and her Royal Highness the Princess Caroline Matilda.

It is said that the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick's return to England will be hastened, on account of some important advices, received from the continent.

It is said more commissions have been signed at a certain great board within the eight days past, than had been for eight weeks before.

Yesterday the Right Hon. William Pitt, was much indisposed, at his house in Harley-street, Cavendish-square.

Letters from Senegal advise, that Governor O'Harra was proceeding to make a factory, and settlement at Arguin, on the African coast, which would effectually secure the gum trade from any farther encroachments of the French.

They write from Glasgow, that the bounty obtained on merchants importation of American timber, will this year amount to upwards of five thousand pounds.

There was an extraordinary board of Treasury held this day, as well as yesterday.

Whitehall, July 1. The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Hon. William Henry, Earl of Rochfort, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Most Christian King.

St. James's, July 11. His Majesty in council was this day pleased to order, that the parliament, which stands prorogued to Saturday, the 12th of this instant, July, should be further prorogued to Tuesday, the 16th day of September next.

St. CHRISTOPHERS,

Basseterre, August 16. On Thursday last, between 11 and 13 o'clock, a terrible surf began, which continued all that day, inasmuch that all business on the Bay was obliged to be suspended; and, as a southerly wind was apprehended, the small craft quitted the road and stood out to sea. We hear of no damage being done, except a boat and a canoe being stove. Yesterday, the surf being much abated, most of the small vessels returned.

Boston, September 8.

Since our last Accounts have been received of the violent Proceedings of Rantlear's Party at Nobletown, &c. and of the distressed Condition the Inhabitants were in. On Sunday the 9th of August, a Party took Possession of the House of one Isaac Spoor, and all that was therein, and informed said Spoor that the House was in New-York Government: This House stands on a Grant of Land made by this Province, and has been a licensed House for a Tavern for many Years by our Courts; it stands about 4 miles West of Great-Barrington Meeting-House but within the District of Egremont, near the East Part, and but a small distance from the West Line of Great-Barrington, and between two and three miles East of the Line that was formerly run for a twenty Mile Line from Hudson's River.---This Tavern the Party made their Head Quarters; a Deputy-Sheriff with one or two Persons were admitted to pass the Guards in the Evening, who, having obtained Leave from the Commanding Officer, served a Warrant on Robert Rantlear; upon this there was a terrible Bluster, the Soldiers under Arms, all their Bayonets fixed, and confined the Sheriff, as also the Justice who went to endeavour to settle Matters, until almost Day-break; This alarmed the whole County; and in the Morning a great Number of the people, with about 40 Stockbridge Indians, collected together, to give the Party Battle, but meeting with the gentlemen that had been detained, it was happily prevented. The Regulars withdrew early in the Morning, and the People returned Home.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 11.

Extract of a Letter from London, dated June 12, 1766.

"At present a thorough Change in the Ministry is just about to take Place, of which I can only give you the Out-lines.---Mr. Pitt is to be one of the Secretaries of State, and the Duke of Grafton the other. Lord Shelbourne is talked of for Secretary for American Affairs, as is Lord Halifax for First Lord of Trade.---The Duke of Newcastle, and his Friends, it is said, are to be left out, and very great Changes are to be made in most of the Public Offices.---Mr. Pitt is undoubtedly a Man of Spirit, and, from his Popularity, is able to do great Things. We shall now see what Figure he will again make at the Head of Affairs, as it is most certain that he is capable of doing more for his Country, than any other Man alive.---To our Enemies his very Name is terrible; and at home such Savings may be made, and such Schemes may be by him carried into Execution, as might be of infinite Service in lessening our enormous Debt, which is of the last importance; for the French carried on the last two Years of the War against our Funds, imagining we should never be able to raise Money to continue it, but they found themselves mistaken. The Chancellor, it is thought, will either keep the Seals, or at least get an Equivalent.---I don't find that George Greenville comes into any Place."

On Sunday last arrived here the Ship Rose, from Belfast, after a Passage of 14 Weeks; she was brought in by the Mate, Mr. Loage; her late Commander, Captain M Nutt, having died at Sea the 5th of last Month. On the 13th ult. they fell in with Captain Walter Surling, in his Majesty's Ship Rainbow, in Long. 60, Lat. 31, who behaved to them in the most humane and genteel Manner, kindly sparing them a Thousand Weight of Bread, and offered them any other Provisions they wanted. Captain Surling was then out from Virginia for England 14 Days. Much about the same Time, two Lads, Brothers, of the Name of M^r Lung, in a hard Gale of Wind at W. S. W. the Ship lying too, were washed overboard and drowned; and some time after she sprang her Foremast and Mizzenmast in another Gale of Wind; and, in general, had a stormy Passage; the People all very healthy.

Tuesday last Captain Long arrived here from Lisbon, but left from Madeira, in five Weeks.---Captain Lisle, in a Schooner, sailed about a Week before him, for New-York; and a Sloop, Captain Harvey, sailed in Company with him for the same Place. By Captain Bolitho, from St. Martins, we learn, that about

the Middle of the last Month they had a hard Gale of Wind at St. Eustatia, in which the Vessels were all obliged to put out to Sea; he did not hear of their receiving any particular Damage, but says some Houses were washed down.---Captain Bolitho kept Company three Days with Captain Founder, in the Schooner Rachel, for New-York from St. Eustatia, and parted with him the Twenty-fourth ult. all well.

Captain Egdon in London; Captain Keith at Bristol; Captain Mackey at Londonderry; Captains Ash and Taylor at Belfast; Captains Davidson, Montgomery, Potts, Hazelwood, Driscoll, and Tripe at Lisbon; Captain Sibbald at Madeira; Captain Johnson at St. Christophers; and Captain Ad-derly at Providence.

Arrived in London. Captain Jarold, from Maryland; and Captain Jarvis, in Twenty-six Days, from Boston.

Deals, July 7. Sailed, the Nancy, Richardson, for North-Carolina; and the Pratt, Freeman, for Boston.

Since our last Captain Graham arrived here from Dublin.

On Monday the 1st Instant, his Excellency Sir HENRY MOORE, Bart. left Albany for Crown-Point, having before he set out, been pleased to send a Reprieve to the Sheriff of Dutchess County, respecting the Execution of WILLIAM PENDERGAST, until his Majesty's pleasure should be known.---After his Excellency's Departure, his truly worthy and charitable Lady, looked down from her exalted Station on the poor Prisoners in Albany Goal, and sent for a List of them, and the Sum which they were committed for; and graciously sent Money to redeem all such as were confined under Thirty Pounds, by which several Prisoners obtained their Liberty, and support their helpless Families, who all echo their Gratitude to their pious Benefactress.---She also ordered a daily Provision for all the rest of the Prisoners who still remain confined.---Her Goodness is also experienced by several other Captives, and poor Persons.---Heaven reward her in this and the World to come.

BRADS and tacks, of various sizes; bulions, scupper nails, brimstone and alum, slates, writing paper, ivory and horn combs, hones and oilstones, white fishline, very fine and midding knitting pins, best awl blades, and Masheen shoe tax and pinners, table knives and forks, cutteaux knives, with and without piffel cap, 1/2 inch best spike gimblets, trace chains, money scales, cant, crosscut, hand and tinering files, hinges of various kind; screw-plates, trunk and chest locks, fid irons, snuffers, with and without stands; best awgers, of various sizes; engineer bits, scribing and socket gouges, pin mawls, coopers bulling and drawing knives, mill saws, ballast shovels, garden stones, spring and shutter bolts, with many other articles; he also has, a quantity of neat iron ware; such as saucepans, with and without covers, of different sizes; teakettles, stewpans and kettles, of one gallon, six quarts, and two gallons, the inside of the whole of which are neatly tin'd; also cart and waggon boxes, chaise, redwood, copperas; and many other articles too tedious to infer here.
