LONDON,

April 4. It is proposed to the consideration of the useful Society for promoting Agriculture, &c. whether it would not be serviceable, as the stock of cattle in this Kingdom is at present greatly deficient, and to which the dearth of meat, butter, and cheese is in a great measure to be attributed, to offer premiums to persons who shall rear, within a limited time, the greatest number of calves and lambs, which, besides contributing to lower the prices of meat, butter and cheese, would be of great service to our manufactures of wool and leather, by furnishing greater quantities of materials to be wrought, and at a cheaper rate than they can now be procured for.

It is said that our Governors in America are ordered, for the future, to send over (annually) the state and condition of the province over which they preside.

Monday morning the 22d ult. the following extraordinary affair happened at Ferrybridge: the wife of Thomas Benson, of that place, being suddenly taken ill, she to all appearance expired, and continued without any symptoms of life the whole day, and every proper requisite was ordered for her funeral; but the husband hoping for some consolation in his distress, by some money which he had reason to believe she had secreted from him in her life-time, began to search for it on Tuesday morning, and found seven pounds ten shillings in crown pieces, concealed in her box; though upon his attempting to take it away, he was surprised by his wife, who was just then recovered, met him, and terribly frightened him by appearing as if nothing had happened, and continued seemingly in health till Thursday noon, when she actually expired.

A few days ago a feast was given at a tavern at the West end of the town, where an ox's head (the first ever known) was dressed turtle fashion, by an eminent man cook, for the entertainment of several gentlemen; and that it is thought will become a dish in vogue among the economists.

Last week 150 half peck loaves, and 120 quarter loaves of good household bread, were distributed to the poor of the parish of Eaten Socon in Bedfordshire, being the donation of the Marquis of Tavistock.

Capt. --- Brother to a noble Earl, being at the French Court, and living in a most remarkable splendid and expensive Manner, the French King took an Occasion, one Day at Court, to hint his Observation of it to the Captain, who returned for answer, with some pleasantry, that "he thought it his Duty to distribute amongst his Majesty's Subjects some of the Money he had taken from them in the War." I am glad, (replied his Majesty, with much Good Nature, and smiling) "I have found an Enemy so truly and generously conscientious."

DUBLIN, FEBRUARY 28.

THE winds having been for some time contrary, has occasioned a scarcity of coals on the river; to relieve the distresses of the poor by this accident, our chief magistrate has ordered the publick coal yards to be kept constantly open, when any person may be supplied on producing a certificate, signed either by the minister or church-wardens of any of the parishes in this city: several have been relieved, and the rich as well as the poor, on every the like occasion, must feel the good effects of this useful and well-conducted institution.

MARCH 3. On Tuesday last the Elizabeth, Captain Christopher Miller, arrived here in 33 days from New-York, who, on the first ult. a little to the westward of New-Foundland, met with the hull of the Sloop Sufannah, Matthew Simonton, Master, and four men more on board, belonging to Casco-Bay, who were in the greatest distress, having been tossed like a log on the sea, for three months and ten days, without mast, bowsprit or rudder, and without provision for 30 days, except a little salt fish, that barely kept life in them, until they had the happiness to meet with Capt. Miller, who has brought them into this port.

CORKE, Feb. 23. About two o'clock on Friday morning, the dwelling house of Mrs. Molloy, in St. Finbarry's, was broke open by two villains, armed with a long knife and a pitchfork (one of whom had his face blackened) who took thereout four guineas and some silver, had the assurance to light a candle, and drank 2 bottles of wine, and afterwards made their escape thro' the church-yard. So great was their precaution, they would take neither plate, cloaks, nor rings, which they saw and handled. The villains spent near three hours in drinking the wine and searching the house, without any seeming apprehensions of danger from the Watch; and, it is remarkable, were not known to pass through that quarter for the night.

CORKE, March 3. Monday last, at Mallow-Fair, a Man choked himself by Excess of Eating. He had laid a Bet with his Companion that he would eat Three-penny worth of new Bread and two Pounds of Cheese, while the other could sup two quarts of Ale with a Table Spoon; and while the first was taking the last Bit, he declared he had never before got such a delicious Feast of the Kind, but he was afraid it would spoil his Meal on Pancakes the next Day.

A short time ago one Tedder, a poor man who lived at a village in Essex, bordering on Suffolk, had a copyhold Estate left him of about 30l. per Annum; in Consequence he applied to the Steward of the Manor, (the Lord of which is now at Paris) but not having Money to pay the necessary Fine, which amounted to a Year's Income, he was refused Admission: In order to obtain it, he declared he would go to Paris; his Neighbours looked upon his Scheme as foolish and romantick, and dissuaded him from it, but he persisted in his Resolution of prosecuting his Journey: Accordingly he muffled up all he was worth, went forward on his Expedition, and embarked with his Son, about 12 Years old, at Dover. On his landing at Calais, he had only a Groat left, and understood not a Word of the Language of the Country, but luckily meeting with a Blacksmith, who had been formerly a Prisoner of War in England, and could speak English, he informed him of his Story; the Blacksmith wrote a brief Narrative of the Case, and bid him apply to the Houses on the Road, and shew the Paper, which was attended with very happy Success, being hospitably supplied with coarse Bread and Soup, and permitted to lie at Night in the Outhouse. After some Days Peregrination, he arrived at Paris, and soon found out his Lordship's Hotel, where he applied, and being known by some of the Servants, he had the Honour of being introduced to his Lordship, in his miserable and ragged Condition, having scarcely Clothes to his Back, or Shoes to his Feet. On telling the Reason of his Visit, his Lordship, who remembered the Man, could not help laughing heartily at the Oddity of his Scheme; he was afterwards introduced to her Ladyship, and by both their Bounties he and his Son were new-clothed, and generously relieved with Money sufficient to carry them home; his Lordship likewise forgave the Fine, and gave him an Instrument, signed by himself, in order to have Admission to his Estate: The poor Man was overwhelmed with Gratitude, expressed his Sense of it in the best Manner he was able, and on his Return took Possession, to the Astonishment of his Neighbours.

Pensacola, in West-Florida, April 5.

House of Assembly, Friday 3d of April, 1767. Report of a committee of the whole house appointed to take the present state of the government of this province into consideration.

1st. Resolved, THAT the house will on all occasions, support and maintain his Honor the Lieut. Governor's administration, in conformity to his Majesty's intentions, and that they will, as far as in them lies, endeavour to render them easy, happy and honorable to him; and that they will at all times maintain the just prerogative of the Crown, as well as the rights and liberties of the people.

2d. Resolved, That the pretending or attempting to exercise the government of this province, or the issuing proclamations or orders in the name of the Governor, without the advice and consent of his Majesty's Council, is contrary to his most gracious Majesty's royal instructions, and a dangerous and unwarrantable innovation in the constitution.

3d. Resolved, That the obliging the Members of the Assembly to meet at the expiration of every prorogation, when the public business does not require it, is attended with many inconveniences, besides giving unnecessary trouble to the Members.

4th. Resolved, That these irregularities seem to proceed from his Honour the Lieutenant Governor's being advised thereto, by some weak or evil disposed persons.

5th. Resolved, That whatever persons or persons have advised his Honour the Lieutenant Governor to exercise the civil government of this province, without the aid, advice, and assistance of his Majesty's Council, are enemies to his Majesty, to his Honor the Lieutenant Governor, to the Constitution, and to the laws and liberties of the people.

6th. Resolved, That such persons, are endeavouring to innovate and alter the civil constitution established by his Majesty in this province, to alienate the minds of the people from his Honor's administration, to destroy public peace and harmony amongst us, and throw every thing into anarchy and confusion.

7th. Resolved, That his Honor the Lieutenant Governor be humbly requested to remove such persons from his presence, and that in conformity to his Majesty's instructions, he make choice of such able and discreet persons to fill up the vacancies in his Majesty's council, as are most capable to aid and assist him in his administration.

Williamsburgh, May 7.

Arrived in James river, the Polly, Woodford, and in the Rappahannock river, Britannia, Livingston, both from London; from White-baven, in James river, the Neptune, Eidebeck.

Stewart, Esq; Superintendent of Indian Affairs for the Southern Department, are to hold a congress at Salisbury, in North-Carolina, with the Cherokees in order to settle a boundary Line with that nation; a matter that seems very interesting to the frontiers of the southern colonies, as many acts of violence have been lately committed by that nation for want of proper restrictions as to their hunting grounds.

Boston, May 4.

We can assure the public, that a pamphlet is now in town, printed in London, which contains many letters wrote by the favourers of the late stamp-act in America. These letters we shall favour the public with as soon as we can obtain them; but are sorry they cannot give any pleasure to a real friend to his country, as they contain more falsehood, malice and ill-will towards America than even a B---d was ever suspected for.

Some men of power among us have affected to censure the conduct of New-York, in not making that provision for the King's troops that was specified in the M---y Bill, when it is notorious, that very gentlemen upon the first sight of said Act, expressed their utmost dislike of it, and gave it out publicly as their opinion, that it was full as unconstitutional and dangerous an attempt upon our rights, as was the stamp-act. Even Mr. S---O---r declared his surprize, that our patriots were so backward to take the alarm.

BOSTON,

May 18. Last Tuesday Evening arrived here Capt. Holmes in a Spow from Bristol, in 6 Weeks; he sail'd from thence in Company with Capt. Barlett, in a Brig for this Place. Another Vessel for this Port was to sail about a Fortnight after him.

In Capt. Smith who arrived here on Friday last from London, came a fine Picture of the Right Hon. M. S. CONWAY, Esq; which is to be placed in Faneuil-Hall, agreeable to a Vote of the town, pass'd in September 1765, as a standing Monument of our Gratitude to him for his noble and patriotic Speeches in Parliament in favour of the Colonies, their Rights and Privileges.

We learn from Louisburg, that the Winter past was extremely severe there, and so intensely cold that boiling Water, placed in the open Air, was frozen to a solid Ice in 25 Seconds.

Salem, May 15. By Capt. Thomas Lee, who arrived here Yesterday in 39 Days from Cadiz, we are informed of the following remarkable Event, viz. That about the Beginning of April last, a few Days before he sailed, the whole Fraternity of Jesuits were, by an Order from Court, expelled that City, in the following Manner. Parties of Soldiers were, without any previous Notice, placed before the Doors of all the Houses, Convents, &c. where any of that Society were supposed to be, in the Dead of Night, and continued there till the next Night, when it was said the City was cleared of them. It is thought they were shipped to Italy. The common Report at Cadiz was that all the Effects of these Fathers were confiscated, and that the abovementioned Orders were to be executed throughout the Kingdoms of Old and New Spain, the same Night.

Newport, May 18.

The only Person saved out of the Ship Peggy, Capt. Felke, of this Place, bound to London, whose Loss we lately mentioned, come to Town last Week, and informs, that a few Days before the Ship was lost, they took up 4 or 5 Men in a Boat, who belonged to a Vessel which foundered: That in a very few Minutes after the Peggy struck, which was off Portland, she beat to Pieces; and that he (our Informant) with two others, the Sea running prodigious high, held to the Mainmast, but only himself was able to get ashore: And that a considerable Part of the Cargo, and also a large Sum of Money, belonging to the Crown, remitted Home from his Majesty's Custom-House in this Place, were saved.

Capt. Bradfield, who arrived here last Week from Jamaica, in 33 Days, brought in Capt. Robert Russell, and Mr. Scott, of that Island, with several others, to the Number of five besides four Negroes, who belonged to the Sloop Dove, bound from Jamaica to Georgia, which was cast away, the 16th of April, on the Collarados, off the West End of Cuba, where the Vessel and Cargo were lost: The next Day the Men arrived in their Boat, at Cape Antonio, 14 Leagues from where the Sloop was lost; and on the 20th, Capt. Bradfield appearing in Sight, took them all on board.

Philadelphia, May 21.

Extract of a Letter from London, March 21, 1767.

Nothing material hath happened lately, unless that the Land Tax hath been lowered to Three Shillings, which the Opposition carried against the Ministry, contrary to their Expectations. This Measure, however, is far from popular; for any Reduction of Taxes, till we have cleared some Millions of Debt, which is yet unfounded, or indeed till we have made some Progress in clearing some Part of our enormous Debt in general, is by no Means the Thing. The Ministry remain as they were, and some say the Differences between them and Lord Chatham are accommodated. How far this is true, I cannot determine. Charles Townshend still keeps his Place, nor have any Changes been made for some Time past. Upon the whole, there is no judging, by Appearances, of the Stability of the Ministry; they may remain all this Winter as they are, and they may be all turned Topseyturvy before next Packet. The East-India Company's Affair remains unsettled, but comes soon before the House again. Lord Chatham's long Absence at Bath, hath much retarded that Affair, and many others too, of almost equal Importance.

His Excellency the Governor of New-Jersey, has, by Advice of Council, appointed the General Assembly of that Province to meet at Burlington, on Tuesday the 9th Day of June next, for the Dispatch of Business, and circular Letters are issued to notify the same. Since our last Capt. Sparks sailed for London, with whom went Passengers Messieurs Tench and Turbutt Francis.

Capt. Chevers, from Cork, on the 2d Instant, in Lat. 38: 39 Long. 60, met with a very violent Gale of Wind, which lasted about 12 Hours; during the Gale his Ship was twice laid on her Beam Ends, and shifted her Ballast, which obliged him to cut away the Mizzenmast to right her, but happily he received no other Damage.

Capt. McCaddon, from Londonderry, on the 14th of April, in Lat. 47: 49, Long. 36, spoke a Brig from New-York, for Dublin, out 23 Days, all well, but the Sea ran so high he could not learn the Master's Name. 25th, in Lat. 38, Long. 42, spoke the Brig General Conway, belonging to New-York, from the Bay of Honduras for Amsterdam, out 34 Days. On the 9th instant, in Lat. 41, Long 66, he spoke a schooner from St. Croix for Boston, 18 Days out. And the next Day, in Lat. 38: 30, Long. 67, he spoke a Brig from Piscataqua for Jamaica, 8 Days out.

Capt. Craig, from St. Eustatia, on the 2d Instant, in Lat. 34: 25, Long. 71: 30, spoke a Snow, Capt. Charles Hill, from South-Carolina for Cowes, 8 Days out, all well.

Capt. Hazelton from Jamaica, the 21st ult. fell in with capt. Davidson for Bristol, who informed him, that the day before, he saw a sloop which he took to be New-England built, ashore on the Collarados, with her sails unbent and no person on board, but the breakers ran so high he could make no further discovery.

Capt. Tillet from London, on the 26th of April, in Lat. 31: 57, Long. 70, spoke a Ship from Charlestown for Portsmouth, out 5 Days. 30th, off Cape Hatteras, he spoke a Sloop from Edenton for Piscataqua; and the same Day spoke a Ship from Ocracoke for Liverpool, both two Days out.

Capt. Hodge from Anguilla, on the 10th Inst. off of Chincoteague Shoals, spoke a Brig, Capt. Sampson, from Demarara, for this Port, out 20 Days.

By Capt. Miller, from Jamaica, but last from South-Carolina, in 15 Days, we learn, that the Ship Ann, Capt. Fortain; and the Brig Philadelphia Packet, Capt. Harrison, were arrived at Charlestown, from this Port.

The Three Brothers, Capt. Bennet, from St. Christophers to Wilmington, is ashore on Hereford Bar, to the Northward of Cape-May, where it is feared she will be lost, but the Cargo saved.

New-York, May 25.

By Capt. Thompson arrived here in 20 Days from Montevideo, we have Advice, that the Trade between that Place and the French on Hispaniola, has lately had a severe Check put to it, from a Proclamation issued by the French General, prohibiting all Communication or Trade with the Mount: Capt. Thompson left about 40 English Vessels there, many of whom would be obliged to leave the Place without getting their Load, only two of which belonged to New-York, Capt. Mercer, and another.

By Capt. Elder from St. Croix, we learn, that the Crop of Sugar this Season falls much short of Expectation at that Island, occasioned by a great Drought, some Time before the Canes were ripe.

Last Wednesday Afternoon Capt. Harriot in a Brig arrived here in 13 Days from St. Eustatia: On Saturday the 16th, he spoke with a Brig, bound from Maryland to Glasgow, all well.

Wednesday Afternoon the Ship America, Capt. Peters, arrived here in 3 Weeks from Bristol; but brings no News later than

we already have:—The 7th of April, in Lat. 49, Long. 15, spoke with the Ship St. Helena, Capt. Arthur, from South-Carolina bound for Gofport; out 31 Days.---April 11, in Lat. 50, Long. 20, spoke with the Ship Mary, Capt. Strawbridge, from the Bay bound for Bristol,---and May 11, in Lat. 36, Long. 62, spoke the Brig Charming Sally, Capt. Taylor, of New-York, from the Bay bound for Holland, out 30 Days, all well. He left at Bristol, the Captains Lawrence, Chambers and Haight, all of New-York, who were beginning to take in their Lading. Capt. Holmes of New-York, failed in a Snow for Boston, the same Time with Capt. Peters.

We hear from Gofthen, that on Thursday Afternoon last, in a high southerly Wind, a Fire by some unknown Accident, broke out in the Roof of the Dwelling-House of Mr. Richard Gale, of that Place, and notwithstanding all Endeavours, the House was entirely consumed, together with a Barn, and several out Houses. Most of the Household Goods were saved. A Neighbour's House was with Difficulty preserved.

We hear from Connecticut, that at a late general Election of Magistrates in that Colony, for the ensuing Year, the same Governor, Deputy Governor, and Council, that were chosen last Year, were re-elected, by a great Majority.

Friday Night last the Brig Juno, Capt. Cole, arrived here from Boston in eight Days: He failed from thence in Company with Capt. Smith, who has on board the noted Mr. Andrews that murdered Capt. Duryee of this Port, and all his Crew but one, on their Voyage from hence for Antigua, as has been mentioned in this Paper.

Thursday last four 3 Year old Coats started at Woodbridge in New-Jersey, for a Plate of £20, which was won by one belonging to Mr. Farnar.

Capt. Kendall from St. Eustatia, on the 11th Instant, in Lat. 31, 52, Long. 66, 38, spoke with Capt. Hunter, in a Brig from Philadelphia, for the West-Indies, 6 Days out, all well on board.

Yesterday Capt. in Gibbs arrived here from the Musqueto-Shore in 33 Days: In the Gulph he spoke with the Brig Dolphin, Capt. Gardner, from Jamaica, bound for Rhode-Island, all well on board. Captain Gibbs has brought Passengers, Mrs. Otway, (and her Child) Wife of the late Joseph Otway, Esq; a Capt. in the 29th Regiment, and Superintendent at the Shore, who died on board said Sloop in the Gulph the 11th Instant. The Revd. Mr. Post also came a Passenger in Captain Gibbs.
