## The Pittites and the Foxites.

In course of the great and long protracted Debate in the British House of Commons, upon the Irish Propositions, the irritated chieftain of the latter party, rose in reply to Mr. Pitt, the Chancellor of the Exchequer's violent, some say unprecedented, attack on Lord North, Mr. Fox, and Mr. Sheridan; and thus Mr. Fox commenced:

MR. PITT urged four charges against the Opposition. These four charges comprehend the substance of the speech, and are as follow:—That they had shifted their grounds—that they were playing a double game—that Lord North and Mr. Sheridan were perfectly inconsistent—and that Mr. Fox failing to convince that House of the danger of the Propositions to the commerce of England, had now, for the first time, discovered an attack upon the Irish constitution, and therefore endeavoured to raise the jealousy of that kingdom against the system.

Mr. Fox began with remarking, that in the personal and political character of the Right Hon. Gentleman over against him (Mr. Pitt) there were many qualities and habits that had often surprised him, and he believed that confounded the speculations of every man, who had ever much considered or analyzed his disposition; but that his conduct on this night had reduced all that was unaccountable, incoherent, and contradictory in his character in times past, to a mere nothing—that he shone out in a new light, surpassing even himself, and leaving his hearers wrapt in amazement, uncertain whether most to wonder at the extraordinary speech they had heard, or the frontless confidence with which that speech had been delivered. Such a farrago (continued Mr. Fox) of idle and arrogant declamation, uttered in any other place, and by any other person, upon the subject in question, would naturally fill the Members of that House with astonishment;—but spoken by that Hon. Gentleman within these walls, in the presence of those who were witnesses of all the proceedings upon this business, every one of whom could bear testimony to the gross and unblushing fallacy of the Hon. Gentleman.—It was an act of boldness, a species of Parliamentary hardihood, certainly not to be accounted for upon any known or received rules of common sense and common reasoning.

I cannot help, said he, re-quoting a passage which I have quoted once before when this subject was in discussion; and I do it the more cheerfully now, as it applies with greater force, if possible, than in its former application:

Telephus ac Pelus cum pauper, et exul uterque,  
Proicit ampullas, et essequipedalia verba.

Beaten out of every thing that bears the semblance of argument, without the least shred or remnant of reasoning to support him, the Hon. Gentleman is forced upon the rash and dangerous hazard of carrying the war into the enemy's camp; and finding it impossible to say one word in vindication of his own deformed and miserable system, he is obliged to throw out a series of invectives, and by exhibiting a list of charges against us, (charges which the very moment he gives them utterance, he knows to be absolutely, and entirely destitute of every vestige of truth) to engage the attention, and divert the notice of the House from his own wretched, and contemptible schemes. The admirable argument of my Hon. friend is answered with hard epithets, with strong assertions, with lofty phrases, with long and laboured calumnies, and with the usual round of redundant and disgusting egotisms.—In proportion to the poverty of the cause he engages in, is the pompous assumption of the Hon. Gentleman;—and of all the various singularities which compose the Hon. Gentleman's character, nothing, I confess, amazes me so much, as the perfect composure, with which he attempts to criminate his adversaries, upon points in which he is himself, of all men living, the most vulnerable;—and the steadiness and resolution with which he puts forth accusations in a desperate defiance of truth, and with as determined a contempt of prudence and propriety in the manner of urging them.

Before I touch upon the charges to which I allude, I cannot help observing, with what a special grace that Hon. Gentleman ridicules long speeches—with what a singular justness is it that he, of all the Members in this House, attempts to correct others for occupying much of the time of the House. I do not intend to deny the Hon. Gentleman the merit of great abilities, great eloquence, and powers of pleasing his hearers; but of all the crimes to be urged against any person within these walls, the last undoubtedly for him to venture upon, is to charge the long duration of his speech as a fault against any Member.—He (like myself) is under the necessity of troubling the House much oftener, and for a much longer time than is perhaps agreeable; and it ill becomes either of us to reprobate others for a practice we ourselves so frequently fall into. Grateful for the indulgence we are favour-

ed with, and sincerely thankful for the patience and the politeness with which we are honored, we should certainly be the last to condemn that, in which ourselves are the greatest transgressors.—And I shall drop this part of the subject, with only remarking, that if an almost uniform deviation from the immediate subject in discussion,—if abandoning liberal arguments for illiberal declamations,—if frequently quitting found sense for indecent sarcasms, and preferring to rouse the passions, and inflame the prejudices of his auditory, to the convincing their understandings and informing their judgments, tended to diminish the title of any Member of this House to a more than common portion of its temper and endurance.—I do not know one Gentleman who would have so ill-founded a claim upon it, for such favors, as that very Hon. Gentleman himself.

The Right Hon. Gentleman has struggled much to fix a charge of inconsistency upon my noble friend, and upon my Hon. friend near me (Mr. Sheridan); and such is the fatality of an inordinate appetite for accusation, that the only point by which he has chosen to illustrate this inconsistency, is a point that proves, as clear as day light, that both the one and the other is perfectly and thoroughly consistent.—The noble Lord supports the fourth Proposition because he thinks it makes laws no more for Ireland than is in this instance just. The Hon. Gentleman reprobates it, because he thinks it an insidious, a deceitful, and treacherous manoeuvre to cheat the Irish out of their independence, and gull them into servility, by prospects of advantages of another kind. The noble Lord and the honourable Gentleman have taken the same side, argued upon the same principle, and acted under the same impression, upon the same subject, from the first moment the Right Hon. Gentleman introduced it to this House; their language has been unvarying, and their conduct in strict unison with their respective declarations. The noble Lord has shewn the danger to the trade of England, from the adoption of these Propositions, and has, in my judgment, unanswerably confirmed that the promised compensation is delusive and fallacious in the extreme—in both these positions my Hon. friend concurs—nay, he goes further, and demonstrates that although he might wish well to the Propositions, as generally favourable to the trade of Ireland in their original state, the Hon. Gentleman's alterations have so radically changed their nature, that Ireland will be the positive loser in these three great branches, viz. American, the West-Indian, and the East-Indian trade—so that the only chance she has of benefit, or of indemnifying herself for the injury she receives by the change of her present system of trade in these great lines of commerce, consists solely in the hopes of underselling England in the English market; he therefore considers the arrangement as upon the whole prejudicial to Ireland, (independent of the attempt at resuming the power of legislation under the fourth Proposition) because it is not by the downfall of England that he wishes Ireland to prosper. Thus all my noble friend's argument tended to shew the danger to the manufactures and trade of England from the proposed system.—My Hon. friend admits, that Ireland's only source of benefit is confined to England, for that in the arrangement of the foreign trade every thing is against her; and in this point so triumphantly dwelt upon by the Hon. Gentleman (Mr. Pitt) as the criterion of their contradiction, nothing in fact appears, but the most precise consistency on their part. This detection of his mistake may perhaps (but I believe nothing can) teach the Hon. Gentleman previously to consider a charge before he makes it, and not to waste so much phlegm, nor expend so many fine periods upon subjects, which will only shew his own rashness, weakness, and I had almost said, absurdity!

But the Hon. Gentleman seems determined, at all risks, to fill up the catalogue of accusations; and in the hey-day of his spleen, in the plenitude of his indignation, to condemn every consequence to himself, provided he succeeds in giving him a side blow. What is the world to think of that Hon. Gentleman's discretion and judgment, forth from this night, who, upon the subject of the Irish Propositions, ventures neither more nor less, than to charge us with "shifting our ground," and with "playing a double game?"

Is there a Gentleman here, who, out of this House at the moment, would have believed that the Hon. Gentleman could have been so unguarded, so senseless, so mad, as to stumble upon such a charge. He—He, to talk of our shifting our ground—He, who has shifted his ground, until, in truth, he has no ground to stand upon.—He, who has assumed so many shapes, colours, and characters, in the progress of this extraordinary undertaking.—He, who has proclaimed determinations, only to recede from them—who has asserted principles only to renounce them.—He, whose whole conduct, from the first moment the system has been proposed, is one continued chain of tricks, quibbles, subterfuges, and ter-

giverfations; uniform alone in contradictions and inconsistencies. Compare the twenty Propositions now upon your table, with the eleven original ones, as he introduced them to this House. Compare his language on that day with the language of to-night. Compare the nature of the two strings of Propositions substantially and fundamentally subverted in many parts, in all materially altered—with those reiterated declarations, that not one principle could on any terms be meddled with. Let the House reflect upon these circumstances, and then let them judge whether a grosser piece of insanity was ever heard of, than that the author of all this miserable foolery should charge others with shifting their ground.

And then the Hon. Gentleman is pleased to say, that we are playing a double game. The parent of double games, and the very essence of double dealing through every part of this business, is the very man who has the front to make this charge. But does he think this nation is as blind and senseless as those who in supporting this system within these walls, avow their utter ignorance of it, as the motive that impels them? Does he think an absolute stupefaction has petrified the intellects of men, that he should have the boldness to talk of other people's playing a double game. He who has played a double game with England, a double game with Ireland, and juggled both nations by a train of unparalleled subtlety.

L O N D O N, June 1---6.

The Dutch treaty with France is by no means relished at Berlin, where it is understood that, in case of a rupture between the States and any part of the Germanic body, France is engaged to become a party in the quarrel.

The conduct of the Gentlemen in the House of Commons who supported the Minister against the Merchants and Manufacturers of this insulted country is a disgrace to the character and dignity of Parliament. It cannot be wondered at, that men of plain education and common regular habits of business should be somewhat disconcerted on appearing as evidence on a question most interesting to themselves and their families, before an assembly to whom they have hitherto looked upon as their greatest support. Surely, upon such occasions, nothing can be less dignified, or indeed less decent, for gentlemen high in office, to browbeat the witnesses in the most taunting, contumelious manner, at a moment like the present, which is surely one of extreme anxiety to every real well wisher to the commerce of Great-Britain; it is at once unmanly and disgraceful in the judges of the cause to disturb and confuse the necessary evidence, by all the insolence of office; our young Minister will rue the day when he set himself up against this class of men whom he has thus opposed and insulted.

The last accounts from Constantinople announce, that the Grand Signor had lost one of his sons, named Murat; that a dispute had happened between the Reis Effendi (Secretary of State), which had been adjusted in a conciliatory manner; but that war was nevertheless apprehended between the Porte and the Imperial Court.

The Turks are assimilating rapidly towards the Europeans in their manners and ideas. The freedom of the press, and the consequent dissemination of science, is gaining ground, and becoming more universal. The government even interferes in the attempt to banish the superstitious notions to which people have hitherto been slaves; and it was no doubt with this intention that the Grand Vizier lately appeared masked at a bal pare given by the French Ambassador. He did not, however, go so far as to lay aside the Ottoman habit. (The Grand Vizier has been since this paragraph's date deposed.)

It is expected by most of the naval officers who served in India during the late war, that Sir Edward Hughes will be brought to an account by the Admiralty, for his conduct in the East, particularly for his losing a pitched battle against a French squadron greatly inferior in force and number.

Mr. Cuthbert, Secretary to Sir Edward Hughes, is supposed to have made a greater fortune, during his master's command, than any Commissary or Paymaster either in America or in the East.

An article in the Scotch papers mentions, that a grant of the estate of Perth had been received by Mr. Drummond, of London, in his favour! Now how is it possible that any grant of the estate can have been made to that Mr. Drummond, the great grandson of the Earl of Melfort, brother to the last Earl of Perth, when Mr. John Drummond, that Earl of Perth's own grandson, is now in town, maintaining his right not only to that great estate, but to the unattainted titles of his grandfather, as Earl of Perth? Could such a grant take place, when Mr. John Drummond, the son of Lord Edward Drummond, has such powerful relations in this nation, as the Duke of Montague, the Earl of Aylesbury, and Lord Brudenel, who are

his cousins, and so watchful over his interests? Mr. Drummond is not only entitled to the title of Lord of Perth, but is also the representative of Charles Earl of Middleton, who was married to Lady Katherine Brudenel, daughter of the Earl of Cadogan.

By the Schooner Hercules, Captain Taylor, arrived last Saturday from Halifax, in Nova-Scotia, we are informed of the safe arrival there of his Britannic Majesty's frigate Thibe, of 28 guns, with Commodore Herbert Sawyer, and his family; a gallant officer in the Royal navy, of twenty years experience and command: This gentleman is appointed to succeed Commodore Sir Charles Douglas, who had desired a recall from that station. The Thibe is one of Admiral Campbell's Newfoundland Squadron, and, we presume, commanded by Captain George Robertson, his nephew, as he had this fine ship last year: This gentleman was one of Admiral Byron's officers in his circumnavigation of the world, the first enterprise that succeeded Lord Anson's.

From the Halifax Journal, dated July 1, we learn that they had received an account of the resolutions of several of the United States, in consequence of Great-Britain's adherence to her navigation act, and considering the merchants and traders of North-America as other foreigners, which had occasioned heavy imposts on British bottoms, quoting an Extract of a Letter from Boston, dated June 17, as follows: "After August, a British vessel arriving here will be obliged to pay five pounds per ton, and twenty-five per cent. on all goods on board, so that you will govern yourself accordingly."

By the Sloop Ann, Captain Dorral, who arrived last Monday from Jamaica, we are informed the Commander, a few days ago landed, at the Capes of Delaware, the Hon. James Luttrell, son of the Right Honourable Simon Lord Viscount Carhampton, and brother to her Royal Highness the Duchess of Cumberland; a commander in the Royal navy of Great-Britain, in which station he, during the last war with France, distinguished himself by the most unexampled, enterprising, and brilliant conduct and exertions. It is said this second Boscawen will, after visiting Philadelphia, take New-York in his route through the Continent.

The following is given in a late London paper as a fact:—Two gentlemen who were rivals in a love-affair, met opposite the Devil Tavern a few days ago, by accident. The one was a surgeon, the other was a lawyer. Some words passed, and the lawyer putting his finger and thumb together opposite the surgeon's nose, and twirling his wrist round, said, "Take that for a pull by the nose." The surgeon went home, and consulted his lawyer, and the affair is next term to be argued in the King's Bench, when the question for the Court and Jury will be, Does the idea of nose-pulling by manual imitation amount to an assault? Not less than four Counsel are retained on this business.

Extract of a private letter, dated Paris, May 19.

"The corpse of the late Duc de Choiseul was, according to custom, presented to the parish church of St. Eustache, and afterwards carried to his seat at Chanteloupe, where he is to be buried, at his own request, in a particular spot of his park; where he has ordered a male cypress to be planted, and another of the female kind, when the last tribute to nature is paid by his surviving consort, whose remains are to be laid next to his own. It is said that his Grace died of a peripneumony, and the fault is publicly laid to the charge of his physician, who would not condescend to be guided by the opinion of Mr. Bartes.
