The following letter was received by a gentleman in this city from the Chairman of a Committee in New-York.

New-York, May 19, 1788.

S I R,

THE importance of the subject upon which we address you we trust will be a sufficient apology for the liberty we take.

The system of government proposed by the late convention to the respective States for their adoption, involves in its questions and consequences in the highest degree interesting to the people of these States.

While we see in common with our brethren of the other States the necessity of making alterations in the present existing federal government, we cannot but apprehend that the one proposed in its room, contains in its principles dangerous to public liberty and safety.

It would far exceed the bounds of a letter to detail to you our objections to the proffered constitution; and it is the less necessary we should do it, as they are well stated in a publication which we take the liberty of transmitting you in a series of letters from a Federal Farmer to the Republican.

We renounce all ideas of local objections and confine ourselves only to such as affect the cause of general liberty, and are drawn from those genuine republican principles and maxims, which we consider as the glory of our country, and which gave rise to the late glorious revolution and supported the Patriots of America in effecting it.

Impressed with these sentiments, we hold it a duty we owe our country, our posterity, and the rights of mankind, to use our utmost endeavors to procure amendments to the system previous to its adoption.

To accomplish this desirable event, it is of importance that those States who have not acceded to the plan, should open a correspondence and maintain a communication—that they should understand one another on the subject, and unite in the amendments they propose.

With this view, we address you on the subject, and request a free correspondence may be opened between such gentlemen in your State, as are of opinion with us on the subject of amendments. We request your opinion on the matter, and that you would state such amendments, as you judge necessary to be made.

As the conventions of New-Hampshire and Virginia will be in session at the same time that ours will be, we have written to some of the members of those conventions, who are opposed to the new constitution in its present form, on the subject of opening a correspondence between the conventions, which we hope will be effected, being convinced, that if put in execution, many good consequences will result.

It is not yet declared who are the members elected for our convention. The ballots are to be counted the last Tuesday in this month. But, by the best information received from the different counties, we have not a doubt of there being a decided majority returned, who will be opposed to the constitution in its present form. A number of the leading and influential characters who will compose the opposition in our convention, are associated with us. We are anxious to form an union with our friends in the other States, and to manifest to the continent, and to the world, that our opposition does not arise from an impatience under the restraint of good government—from local or State attachments—from interested motives or party spirit. But from the purer sentiments of the love of liberty, an attachment to republican principles, and an adherence to those ideas which prevailed at the commencement of the late revolution, and which animated the most illustrious Patriots to undertake and persevere in the glorious, but arduous contest.

WORCESTER, July 17.

At Newhaven, on the 4th inst. was a very large Procession, similar to that in Boston, Portsmouth, and other capital towns; among others who walked in Procession, were School-masters, following their scholars, who amounted in number to about 200, all carrying the various books which they were reading, from the New-England Primer to the works of Virgil and Homer.

A melancholy accident happened the week before last at Brimfield;—Mr. Abel Burr of that town had occasion to raise a crotch for a well pole—the crotch was heavy, and furnished with large pegs for the purpose of going to the top of it at pleasure: He had no help sufficient to raise the crotch to its proper place, and in the height of his exertions it unfortunately fell—in the fall, one of the pegs, which were all squared at the points, caught the calf of one of his legs, and went quite through it. Assistance was afforded as speedy as possible, and for a few days there were hopes of his surviving the misfortune, but a mortification took place, which, in the bloom of life, put a period to his existence.

Strangers. Militia Officers. One Piece of Artillery. By order of the Committee of Arrangements, RICHARD PLATT, Chairman.

Order for the PROCESSION.

On the discharge of 10 guns at 8 o'clock this morning, the various classes of citizens which are to compose the Procession, will please to repair to the Fields, under their proper officers, formed and told off in the manner they propose marching; and immediately on their arrival, an adjutant or orderly person from each, will be sent to St. Paul's Church to receive directions from the superintendent, who will be designated by a blue coat, red sash, and white feather tipped with black, by way of distinction from the following gentlemen who are assistants, viz. Col. William S. Livingston, Col. Giles, Major Bleeker, Capt. Fowler, Capt. Stagg, Captain Duncomb, Capt. Morton, John R. Livingston, Daniel Le Roy, Thomas Durie, Edward Livingston, Staats Morris, John Lefferts, Esquires, who will each be clad in a uniform white coat with blue cape and sash, wear a white feather tipped with blue, and carry a speaking trumpet.

One cannon will be posted on the right and another on the left, the first will fire on the commencement of the formation, and the second for the completion of the line; afterwards the ship will fire 13 guns as a signal for marching, when the whole procession will face to the right, advance and march by the following route, viz.

Down Broadway into Great Dock Street, thence through Hanover-square, Queen, Catham, Division, and Arundel-streets, and from thence through Bullock-street to Bayard's house; when the cannon in front will fire and the van halt, the rear close regularly up and dress, and as soon as the left comes up to its ground the rear gun will fire, and be answered with 10 guns from the ship, when the whole line will front the city: This done, the Committee of Arrangements, followed by Congress, Ministers, Foreigners of distinction, and the Gentlemen on horse-back will pass along the line of Procession, and review it, each division afterwards marching off to its table, after proper guards for their insignias, &c. are posted, the artillery will close the rear and fire two guns upon coming to their station, where the flag is displayed as a signal for dining. While at dinner 10 guns will be fired at each coast.

At five o'clock P. M. two guns will fire as a signal for retiring from the table by the left, the rear gun leading and firing when arrived on its ground, the van gun bringing up the rear and firing in its place, after which the ship will fire 13 guns, the line of Procession face to the right about, and advance by Bayard's house, wheel into Great George street, and proceed down to the fields, and form on its first ground, when the van and rear guns will fire in succession, and be answered by a full fire from the ship, upon which the various parties will return to their respective parades, and there be regularly dismissed.

By order of the Committee of Arrangements, RICHARD PLATT, Chairman, and Superintendent of the Day.

It is sincerely to be wished that the greatest decorum may prevail, during the Procession. Every person who is interested in the event which is now to be celebrated, will doubtless consider that much of the honor of the day depends upon the harmony which subsists among the different orders of citizens, who compose the Procession.—Each man should esteem the other as a Brother, engaged in testifying their joy on the commencement of the "EPOCH OF LIBERTY AND JUSTICE."

The last accounts from Poughkeepsie are dated on Monday evening—at which time nothing material had happened.—The opposition were much divided, and appeared to have no regular system in view.

His Excellency the Governor of Massachusetts, at the recommendation of the General Assembly, has issued a BRIEF, to be read in the several religious societies in that Commonwealth, for a Contribution, to carry into effect the benevolent purposes mentioned in the following Petition of the Society for propagating the Gospel among the Indians, &c.

"To the Honorable the Senate, and the Honorable House of Representatives, of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. THE Society for propagating the Gospel among the Indians and others, in North America, beg leave to shew, That one design of our venerable Fathers in emigrating to this land, was professedly to extend the knowledge of our Glorious Redeemer among the Savage Natives; that this design was expressed and enjoined under both the charters granted by the parent State to this colony, and is, in the opinion of the Society, necessary and suitable at all times to be pursued by a people who profess christianity.

That the end for which this Society was instituted by the legislature, was to attend to this important circumstance, and prove to the European

World, who are at a great expense importing this object among us, that we were not inattentive to it. It is the desire, the design, and the ambition of the Society, to pursue the ends and purposes, for which they were incorporated.

The want of funds alone prevents them from exerting themselves in propagating the gospel among the Indians, and extending the means of Christian knowledge among those of the inhabitants of this land who are now destitute of them.

They humbly request your Honors to recommend to his Excellency the Governor to issue a Brief, to be read in all the churches of this Commonwealth, requesting the aid of all piously disposed persons, in carrying on this truly benevolent design, and asking their contributions, in specie, public securities, or any other property, to enable the Society to send the knowledge of our glorious Redeemer, among those who are now perishing for lack of vision, and to extend the means of instruction to our fellow-citizens in the Eastern and other parts of the State, who are now destitute of them.

The Society are not insensible of the difficulties and embarrassments of the present day, and they are sorry to ask the aid of their fellow citizens at a time so distressing, but they cannot be easy to remain any longer inactive from pursuing the great objects of their appointment. The collection upon this occasion will be free, and they do not wish them to be so large as to cause distress to any. A mite thrown into the treasury of the Society by every individual in the State, would amount to a large sum, and would enable them to publish the glad tidings of great joy among those who are now sitting in darkness and in the region of the shadow of death.

Your Honors will pardon the Society for addressing you on this occasion, and requesting this favor at your hands; they can scarcely suppose, however, an apology to be necessary for applying to christian rulers upon a subject which relates so immediately to the honor of the author and finisher of our faith. Your honors will be pleased to observe, that the Society are not asking a favor for themselves, but are supplicating for those, who now suffer in their interest: They are beseeching your honors to pursue a design of which our venerable fathers never lost sight, and to do what may be highly acceptable to that being, upon whom the welfare of States and Empires essentially depends.

They take the liberty to observe, that the peace and harmony which prevailed in general between the Indians bordering on the Northern States of the Union, and the citizens thereof, during the late war, may in a good measure be attributed to the exertions of the Missionaries who were supported among them: and that perhaps it may not now be an object of less political consequence, to continue and encourage their exertions, as the British are practicing every art to induce the Indians to retire from among us, into the more interior parts of the continent, that they may secure to themselves exclusively the benefits of the fur trade, and their alliance in any future rupture.

The Society cannot doubt the attention of the Honorable Court to a subject so important; they hope for a compliance with their request, and as in duty bound shall ever pray.

The ship George, Capt. Hunter, was spoke with on Thursday last, in lat. 38, 30, long. 67, all well. Capt. Mulholland, from Bristol, on the 15th June, in lat. 49, 33, N. long. 17, W. spoke the English India Company's ship Rose, Capt. Dumbay, from China, bound to London, out four months, most of the crew sick with the fever, had buried twenty-six on her voyage, and were in great want of fresh stores, which Capt. Mulholland supplied them with as far as possible.—On the 12th spoke the Houster, Capt. Munroed, from China, all well, who informed of the ship Alliance being arrived at Canton, from Philadelphia, and that she had suffered much in her spars and rigging on her passage, but was all repaired, and expected to sail in a few days.—On the 13th spoke the ship Harmony, Capt. Willet, from Philadelphia, bound to London, out 24 days, all well.

Arrived at New-London. Sloop Julia, Hempsted from St. Martin's; Brig Pamela, Bulkley, St. Croix; Brig Sukey, Prince, from Port-au-Prince, in 22 days; who left there the 24th of June; Brig Dolphin, Folger, belonging to Hudson, condemned for short entry.

Capt. Angel, on the 23d of May, left at Madiera Ship Favorite, Wilson, belonging to New-York.—Brig ———, Carney, from Salem, bound to the East-Indies.—On the 28th June, in lat. 36, 40, long. 66, 30, spoke the Sloop Fanny, Proctor, from Say-Brook Platform, 6 days out, bound to Barbadoes, all well.

On the 1st July, in lat. 38, 15, long. 66, 19, Capt. Angel spoke the ship Rebecca, Stewart, from Baltimore, bound to Limerick, out 4 days, all well.

On the same day spoke the schooner Favorite, Ayres, from New-York, bound to Trinidad, four days out, all well.

From ENGLISH PAPERS received by the BRIG Peggy, from BRISTOL.

V I E N N A, April 30. On the 18th instant, the Emperor arrived at Klerih, a frontier fortress opposite to Schabatz, before which the Austrians were drawn up preparatory to the siege of it.

On the night of the 23d, the approaches being made the batteries were raised, and his Imperial Majesty arrived at the camp the next morning at day-break, soon after which the batteries were opened: But the Emperor perceiving that the side next the river was the most convenient for a general assault, a detachment of the free corps of Servia, and the riflemen of the regiment of Peterwardin, were ordered to advance, covered by the regiment of Esterhazy. This attack proved successful, the enemy being soon obliged to retire to the citadel, when the Emperor, desirous to spare the effusion of blood, and touched with compassion for the women and children, ordered the garrison to be summoned to surrender, which they did immediately at discretion, and were declared prisoners of war; but, in consideration of the brave defence they had made, his Imperial Majesty permitted their wives and children to retire, with their effects, to Zwornick.

The garrison consisted of the Aga of the Janissaries, Mahomed, Commander in Chief, and several other Agas, with sixteen other officers, and about 800 men, horse and foot. There were found in the fort seventeen pieces of cannon of different sizes, and twenty pair of colors.

The Baron de Rouvroy, General of Artillery and Lieutenant-Colonel Prince Poniatowky, were slightly wounded.

The Prince de Ligne, who distinguished himself in the assault, have been rewarded with the Military Cross and appointed Colonel of Engineers.

Vienna, May 3. According to accounts received from Prince Lichtenstein of the 26th of April, an attempt was made by the Austrians, on the 25th, to storm Dubicza, but they were repulsed as they were entering the breach which they had made. In return, the Turks having received a reinforcement, which augmented the garrison to the number of 12,000 men, they sallied out, and attacked the Austrians in the trenches. A general action then commenced, which lasted three hours, and though the Austrians were victorious, Prince Lichtenstein thought proper (all his working batteries) to raise the siege, and in the night of the 25th he crossed the Tisza, and encamped on the heights between Dubicza and Bacin, to cover the Austrian territories from the incursions of the enemy.

L O N D O N, M. 15. A Russian Agent arrived at Port-Bouton on Saturday, to prepare and wait the arrival of Admiral Greig's Squadron.

The reports we stated last week, in circulation, concerning Louis' usurpation intended by the King of France on the authority of the Parliaments, and by the last account confirmed. But whether monarchical power and military violence are to be extended to the entire suppression of the Parliaments, or only a few of the statutory members seized and punished, as an example to the rest, is yet a matter of doubt.

NO ILLUMINATIONS.

Several Booths, having been erected on Federal Green, the Committee earnestly request that no spirituous liquors, on any pretence, be brought there for sale, as it will materially interfere with the arrangements they have made, neither can they be answerable for the consequences.

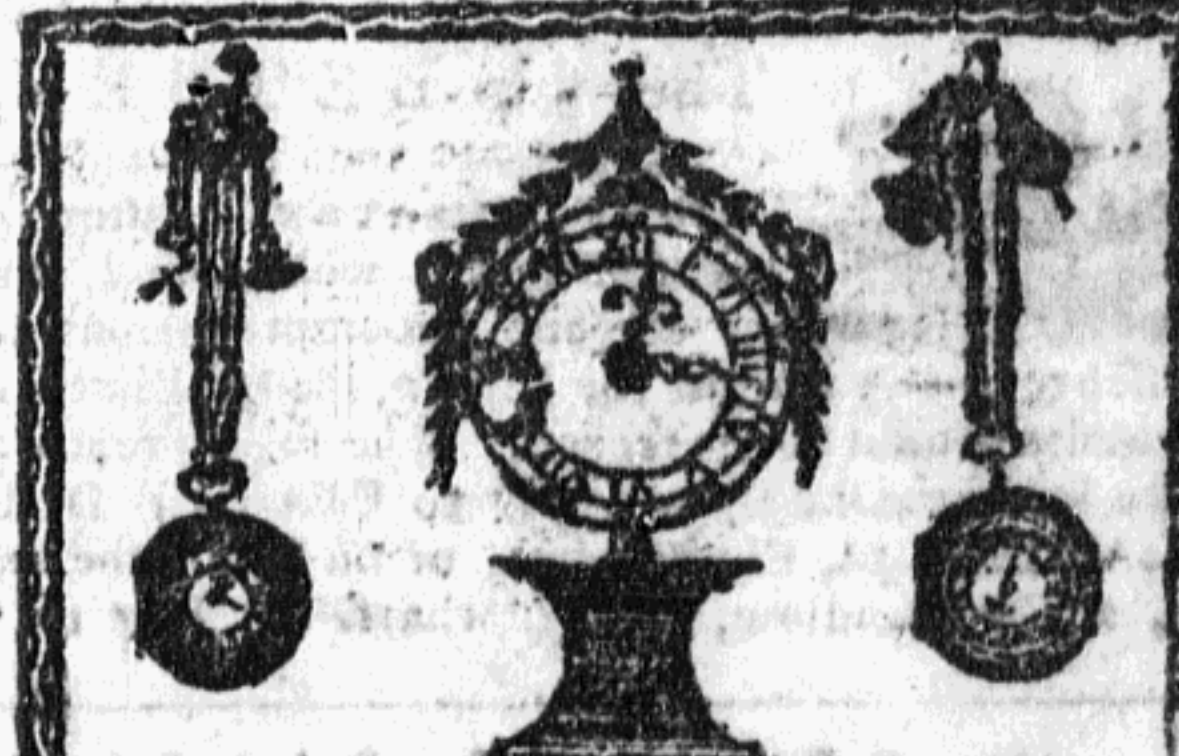
