

From MONDAY NOVEMBER 4, to MONDAY NOVEMBER 11, 1734.

By Capt. Baker who arrived from London last Tuesday, and Capt. Wroe from Bristol the Thursday following, we have the following News.

P A R I S, September 10.



L L the Talk here at present is of great Alliances: Among others, that the Prince Royal and Electoral of Saxony, is to be married to the Eldest Madame de France; that the Duke of Lorraine is to have the Archduchess, Eldest Daughter of their Imperial Majesties; and the Prince Don Carlos the younger: That the Election of King

Stanislaus, and Augustus shall both stand good; and that two Princes Reign in the same Order, wherein they were chosen, and succeed each other according to the Priority of their Election: And lastly, that the Duke of Lorraine shall be nominated King of the Romans, with the Consent of all the Electors. This is the Foundation of our Actions; for we are told, there will very soon be a Cessation of Arms, the Negotiation being actually begun. The famous Goldsmith, Monsieur du Hamel, was found murdered in the Seine a few Days ago, with his Hands tied behind him.

Modena, Aug. 23. We learn from the Banks of Secchia, that a Detachment of Imperialists having advanced towards San Benedetto, had a short Skirmish with some of the Troops of the Allies but it ended with no considerable Loss on either part. Loads of Forage arrive here daily for the use of the Allies: Sixty Waggon came in Yesterday, and were all unladen in the Castle. The French Engineer is making great Improvements in the Fortifications there: Our Gunners are not admitted within the Walls. The Marquis de Peze having acquainted the States of the Duchy that the Kings of France and Sardinia requir'd them to provide Winter Quarters for a large Body of Troops, as likewise to supply their daily Subsistence and Pay, an Assembly was held accordingly, which continued sitting Nine Hours, when it was agreed, that 12,000 Men, as well Foot as Horse, might take up their Quarters in the Country, and that 4000 Foot and 1800 Horse should be entertain'd in the City; but instead of being oblig'd to pay and subsist them, they propos'd to supply once for all 1600 Load of Hay, 8 raw and Wood, 800 Sacks of Meal, and 70000 Livres, of the Money of Milan.

Warsaw, Sept. 1. The Fortress of Stanislawow in Volhinia having stood for some Days the Attack of the Russian Troops, at length surrendered. A Party of about 200 Poles have appear'd several times in this Neighbourhood, and a few Days ago cour'd up to the very Suburbs, where they killed a Groom belonging to the Castellan of Radom, and carried away four Horses; but the Governor soon detach'd after them a Party of Dragoons, who either killed or took Prisoners the whole Number. Great Preparations are making for the Reception of King Augustus,

Manheim, Sept. 5. The French have promised our Court, to make good all the Damage done to these Countries, which is computed at two Millions of Livres. The French Army has passed the Rhine near Fort Louis, very probably to post themselves lower down that River the better to hinder the Imperialists from passing it.

Berlin, Sept. 6. Our Advices from Petersburg are very positive that another bloody Battle has happen'd between the Turks and Persians, wherein the former were again defeated; so that 'tis expected the Grand Signor must drop his Crest and strike up a Peace on the latter's Conditions. The King is expected this Day or To-morrow at Potsdam.

Dantzick, Sept. 6. General Munich being set out for Petersburg, the Command of the Russian Troops is devolv'd on General Lasoy. The Dietine of Polish Prussia is assembled at Graudenz, thin of Members, 'tis true, but very unanimous.

Hanover, Sept. 10. Our Troops upon the Rhine are very sickly. They write from Dresden, that the Court of Saxony are not so glad as they have been, with Regard to the Affairs of Poland; all the Advices from thence agreeing, that the Kingdom begins to be more embroiled than ever; insomuch that they must send more Forces thither, the Army of Tartars, which had just arriv'd at Cadore, being daily reinforced by King Stanislaus's Regiments.

Hamburg, Sept. 10. The French Minister Polign, has received Letters from King Stanislaus, by the Courier he dispatch'd to the North some Time ago, with Advice, that the Affairs of Poland began to take such a Turn, that that Prince may shortly be heard of at the Head of an Army of 100,000 Men. They write from Stockholm, that the States of Sweden had voted the Duke of Holstein 25,000 Rixdollars a Year.

Paris, Sept. 13. The Imperialists continue to forage in the Ferrarese, notwithstanding all the Bustle the Pope has made to prevent them, no Anathema being half so dreadful to some People as an empty Belly. 'Tis given out here, that the Republick of Venice has rejected the Offers which the Emperor made to induce it to declare for him.

Heidelberg, Sept. 15. The Duke of Wirtemberg will have the Command of the Army in the Absence of Prince Eugene: That Prince took such prudent Measures, that the French, after all their Vapouring, were not able to raise any Contributions in his Country. The Count Hamilton is arriv'd here from Vienna, to execute a private Commission on the part of his Imperial Majesty with Prince Eugene.

From the Upper Rhine, Sept. 16. On the 11th Instant several Detachments of French, to the Number of 10000 Men, repass'd the Rhine near Fort Kehl, and 'tis believed will be put in to Winter Quarters in the City of Strasburg.

Hague, Sept. 17. The Duke de Bitonto is at last sail'd for the Kingdom of Sicily, with 360 Transports. He has Orders not to receive any Imperial Troops, unles as Prisoners of War. Thus if the Spaniards make the Conquest of that Island as they have done of Naples, the Emperor will loose this Year above 20,000 of his best Troops on that side. There are not above 1000 Imperialists in Sicily, who have shut themselves up in Messina and Syracuse. They have abandoned Melazzo.

The Spaniards have 18 Battallions and 2000 Horse, a prodigious Quantity of Artillery, Equipage and Provision and (to crown all) Millions of Pieces of Eight. When the Fleet set Sail, a blast of Wind blew the young Chevalier de S. George's Hat into the Sea: Immediately there were several Officers enough to endeavor to take it up; but the young Chevalier called out, *Let it alone, let it alone; I will go and get another in England*: Whereupon the young King of Naples threw his Hat into the Sea and said, *And I will go along with you*: But they may happen to go bare-headed a long time, if they get no Hats till they come among you; for we are well assured, they will find none there that will fit their Heads.

L O N D O N,

Sept. 10. The King has been pleased to grant 1000 l. per Annum to be added to the Salary of the Right Hon. the Lord Harvey, Vice-Chamberlain to his Majesty.

Two Children, a Son and Daughter, of General Diemar, were lately inoculated for the Small Pox; the Daughter, about three Years old; is since dead, and the Son is dangerously ill.

On Wednesday last Capt. Swiney arrived in the River from abroad, and brought two of the largest Tortoises that ever were known in England. He was offered 500 l. for them.

Poland is in a Flare; the Party for Stanislaus being every where on Horseback; Count Tarlo at the Head of 20,000 Horse and 4000 Foot, advanc'd to Warsaw, where there was only a Garrison of 1000 Men, but generously declin'd to plunder it.

On the 28th of August at Night, died at Newcastle House in Clerkenwell Close, in the 96th Year of her Age, her Grace Elizabeth Duchess Dowager of Albermarle and Dutchess Dowager of Montagu. Her Grace was eldest Daughter and one of the Coheirs of Henry Cavendish Duke of Newcastle, and marry'd, first, to Christopher Monke, Duke of Albermarle, Son to the famous General Monk, and next, Ralph Lord Montagu, afterwards Duke of Montagu, Father to the present Duke. She was his Grace's second Wife, and had no Issue by him. She was allied to most of the Noble Families in England. Besides being married in Law to the Duke of Montagu, and consequently Great Aunt to the Dutchess of Manchester and Countess of Cardigan, she was Aunt to the Countess of Oxford; to the Lady Viscountess Morpeth, to the Countesses of Salisbury and Harold, and to the Lady Lovell, Baroness of Clifford. She was likewise Great Aunt to the Dutchess of Portland, to the present Duke of New-Castle, and to the Earl of Rockingham.

'Tis remark'd by Two Holland and Three Flanders Mails, that the Combined Squadron of France and Spain, have Orders to attack ANTY Fleet that shall venture into the Mediterranean, with Design to interrupt the Expedition to Sicily.

The Corsicans being underhand supported by some Foreign Power (Spain perhaps) and supply'd with Arms and Ammunition, have rejected all Offers of Accommodation.

Count Koningsegg having distributed Provisions to his Army for 8 Days, and Ammunition for 24 Charges, it may be inferred from thence, that an Action will soon ensue.

A Report is current, that a Proclamation will shortly be published, to Summon the Parliament to meet upon Business towards the End of November.

In the mean Time, the Naval Forces are daily increased by impressing great Numbers of Men out of all homeward-bound Ships; and the Men of War are so stationed in the several Ports of the Kingdom, that few Seamen escape falling into their Hands; so that the Fleet is much more powerful than it has been for upwards of 20 Years past.

'Tis advised by a Holland Mail, just arriv'd, that the Czarina designs to augment her Fleet next Spring to 50 Sail of the Line, and 36 Frigates; and is building Forts to secure them from any insult.

That Winter Quarters were settling for both Armies on the Rhine, and no Action yet in Italy.

That the Spanish Army were landed on the Island of Sicily.

Sept. 12. The Emperor having had the Preliminaries for a Peace proposed by certain Neutral Powers communicated to him his Imperial Majesty, according to what they write from Vienna, seem'd not pleas'd with them.

The Prince of Nassau Siegen of the Protestant Branch being dead, without Issue, the Emperor has order'd his Country to be taken Possession of, for the Princes of the Popish Branch.

By a Mail from France this Day, 'tis advis'd, that the Spaniards which sail'd the 24th for Sicily, had Orders to begin with the Siege of Messina, and that another Convoy of 4000 Men was arriv'd at Naples from Barcelona.

The extraordinary rise of the Actions at Paris, is confirm'd, the Price being, when the Letters came away, 1310, and the Reason given for it, is the Prospect of a General Pacification, France having, 'tis said, accepted of the Preliminaries.

Nothing is now so much talk'd of here as the Probability of a Peace, and in order to facilitate this great Work, several double Marriages are to take place; among others Don Carlos with the Emperor's second Daughter, &c. on which Account the Stocks are risen, South Sea being 80 1 half. Old Annuities 106 1 4th New Ditto, 104 3 4ths. Bank 140. India 144.

Monday last at Noon a Courier arriv'd at Court, from the Earl Waldgrave; we hear he has brought Advice, that the Imperial Army under the Command of Count Koningsegg, had pass'd the Secchia, in order to give the Marshal de Coigny a Battle.

Sept. 17. The present Alliance between France, Spain, and the King of Sardinia, so formidable as it now is, by the New Acquisition in Italy and Germany, is become an Object of Attention and serious Deliberation, how to preserve an Equilibrium of Power in Europe; and for this End 'tis assur'd, that a Counter Alliance is on the Carpet, between Great Britain, Holland, Sweden, Denmark, and the Republicks of Venice and Genoa, to put a Stop to the Conquests; and the Opinion of People here, that if the Propositions for Peace are not accepted, the aforementioned Alliance will take Place, is in Concert for the most important Security.

The Government has received News of the King of Prussia's Return to Potsdam the 24th Inst. He is from Cleves, but in such a bad State of Health, that his Life was thought to be in great Danger.

Dublin, Sept. 7. On Thursday last died of an Apoplexy, as he was at Dinner, James Coghill, Esq; L. L. D. Member of Parliament for the Borough of New Castle, and Register of the Prerogative Court.

We hear his Grace the Lord Primate has presented Ambrose Phillips, Esq; to the Register's Place in the Prerogative Court, worth 1000 l. per Annum, vacant by the Death of the above Gentleman.

Bristol, Sept. 13. A Gentleman in a Letter from Corke, to a Merchant in this City, gives the following Account of the Pirates that murder'd Capt. Beard, on board the *Buxstove Snow*, on the Coast of Africa, belonging to this Port.

This Gentleman, who dates his Letter from Corke the 27th of August, says, "That by one of his Kerry Correspondents, he had Advice of a Schooner being put in there about a Month before, from the Island of St. Thomas's; the Capt. & Crew of which appearing so flush of Gold, and behaving in such a disorderly manner, as gave suspicion they were Pirating, or had murder'd their Captain, or run-away with the Effects of some honest Gentlemen. This his Correspondent by Enquiry had found that their first Out-set was in a Snow; and that the Schooner which brought them to the County of Kerry, they had found means to sink, commanded by one Duggan, who wasch'd in that County, and believed he had great part of the Effects still in his Custody. That the Crew were all dispersed, having spent a great deal of Cash, without Thought, or at least, like People that did not know the getting of it."

In another Letter he further advises, " That after diligent Search made by his Friend at Kerry, he found the said Capt. Duggan (who was suspicious of this Gentleman seeking him) hid in a Cliff or Rock, cloath'd in Women's Apparel, and was struck with the utmost Confusion, when the said Gentleman took him Prisoner, who desired Duggan to be ingenious in his Confession if he thought of saving himself.

It will be a great Disappointment to the Owners if he should escape, they being certain he is the very Person who went out Boatwain of the Buxton, and with his own Hands cut off Capt Beard's Head while he was asleep on the Deck of his Cabbin, as we lately mention'd.

Norwich, Sept. 14. One Day last Week a Clergyman near North Wallham having been out with his Gun, could not make it go off; and being returned Home, and set by the Fire with his Wife, when a Neighbour coming in, asked, What Sport? He answered his Piece would not go off: Upon which he took it up, to see the Reason of it, and having looked on it, was going to set it down again; but carrying it past the Clergyman unwarily, the Gun went off, and shot him in the Body, upon which he died in a few Hours after, to the great Grief and Surprise of his Wife, who sat by him all the while.

London, Aug. 31. 1734. At a Meeting of the Grand Lodge of the Ancient and Honourable Society of Free Masons, Mr. Henry Price's Deputation of Grand Master for New England, was then and there enlarged to Act as such throughout the Continent of America.

Albany Octo. 9. This Day was apprehended and Committed to Goal one Fraiser for murdering his Wife in a most barbarous Manner.

Philadelphia, Octo. 24. Saturday last, at a Court of Oyer and Terminer held here, came on the Tryal of a Man and his Wife, who were indicted for the Murder of a Daughter which he had by a former wife (a Girl of about 14 Years of Age) by turning her out of Doors, and thereby exposing her to such Hardships, as afterwards produced grievous Sickness and Lameness; during which, instead of supplying her with Necessaries and due Attendance, they treated her with the utmost Cruelty and Barbarity, suffering her to lie and rot in her Nastiness, and when she cried for Bread giving her into her Mouth with an Iron Ladle, her own Excrements to eat, with a great number of other Circumstances of the like Nature, so that she languished and at length died. The Evidence against them was numerous, and in many particulars positive; but the Opinion of the Physician who had visited the Child, that whatever usage might be given her, the Distemper she laboured under was such, as would of itself in all probability have ended her Life about the Time she died, it is thought weighed so much with the Jury, that they brought in their Verdict only Manslaughter.

Sunday Night last John Yekyll, Esq; Collector of the Port of Boston, was married in this City, to Mrs. Margaret Shippens of Maryland; a young Lady of celebrated Beauty, Merit and Fortune.

New York, Nov. 4. On Wednesday last Capt. Bryant in the Ship Albany arrived here in about 8 Weeks from London, by whom we hear, that His Majesty has been pleased to confirm the Hon. James De Lancy Esq; in his post of Chief Justice of this Province.
